e. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2600.1.a - Soccer (Yellow Cards/Ejections)

President Swartwood reviewed this proposed revision which classifies a player being issued two yellow cards in the same game as "disgualified" and removes the consequences of "out the next contest."

f. Sacramento High School - Football Reclassification (Division)

President Swartwood reviewed this proposal which eliminates the requirement that Sacramento High School not be allowed to drop lower than Division 3 in football for post season play.

g. Approval of Full Membership - Sierra Academy of Expeditionary Learning

President Swartwood reviewed this proposal which places Sierra Academy of Expeditionary Learning in the Central Valley California Conference, as a full member, effective the start of the 2022-2023 school year.

h. Approval of Full Membership - River Islands High School

- 5. Winter Sports Information
 - Application to Host & EAP confirmation forms must be turned into the Section office to host playoffs. Schools that have not turned theirs in have been notified.
 - ✓ Brackets and formats are posted on the website and will be filled in as soon as seeding is complete.
 - ✓ Wresting Masters is February 18-19 at Stockton Arena. There is an online meeting for all athletic directors of participating schools on February 8.
 - ✓ Soccer championships start February 22. Boys and Girls D1 Soccer Championships will be held at Heart Health Park on February 24. The EC voted to raise admission at the professional venue from \$12.00/\$5.00 to \$15.00/\$8.00.
 - ✓ Basketball championships will be at Golden 1 Center on February 24-25. There will be an online meeting for all participants on February 15. The Executive Committee initiated a fee of \$150 per team for rounds 0,1, and 2 to take care of any loss the Section may have. If the Section ends up with a surplus that money will be sent directly back to the schools. These rounds are non-mega events and ticket sales will cap at 390 tickets. The loss of revenue is from the players, cheerleaders, administrators, etc. from two teams which equals approximately 110 tickets not being sold. If a school or district wants to make it a mega event the Section will need a letter from the principal and the superintendent certifying they are making it a mega event and all CDPH guidelines will be followed. The semifinals and finals will be mega events.




The charts contained in the following pages summarize our income and expenses over the past ten years in the certain categories; overall income and expenses, regional and state championships, legal and liability income as well as legal and insurance expenses.


Our income has been gradually increasing year over year to well above six million dollars, due to increasing championship events and our statewide corporate sponsorship contract with PlayFly. Although, due to the COVID pandemic, both 2019-20 and 2020-21 saw a decrease in overall revenue and expenses and specifically regional and state championships income and expenses.

Our legal, liability and insurance costs continue to fluctuate each year. In the legal and insurance expense chart, again due to COVID, our overall liability and insurance expenses came in lower than projected due to premium refunds we were able to obtain for reduced championship events in both 2019-20 and 2020-21 years.


Total Income vs Expenses 2013-2023











Proposed Budget

Proposed Budget Summary 2022-2023

This proposed budget for your consideration recommends only minor changes in income and expenses in marketing dollars due to contract adjustments. The budget indicates nearly a \$70,000 end-of-year surplus and the recommended changes are detailed in the budget notes.

Additionally, this budget includes two unfilled administrative assistant staff positions in the burden and salary figures. Given the likelihood that only one of these positions may be filled in the 2022-2023 school year, an additional surplus of \$65,000 may be realized.

Income Overview


Income projections are based using a conservative approach forecasting an increase (1%) in revenue streams to the organization, from \$6.62 million to \$6.68 million. Keeping true to past practice and due to inconsistent revenue the past two years from the pandemic, the projected figures are based on conservative income numbers.


The major sources of income for the CIF are 1) championship events (36%), 2) marketing and corporate support (35%) and 3) legal assessment to schools (18%).

Expenses Overview

Expenses to the organization are projected to have a minor increase (.3%) based on the figures in the proposed budget, from \$6.59 million to \$6.61 million. Our projected expenses show a slight increase in sponsorship and marketing expenses due to contract adjustments.

The major expenses of the organization are 1) championship events (26%) with the majority of those funds being returned to schools to reimburse expenses for team travel and hosting fees, 2) marketing (21%) with most of these funds given directly to CIF Sections for their distribution share in state-wide marketing income, 3) salary and benefits for employees and retirees (21%), and 4) legal, liability, and insurance costs (19%).



These include guaranteed minimums for our income through 2027 for the State and all ten Sections due to a marketing partnership with PlayFly. All marketing contracts, excluding ball and broadcast rights, are processed through PlayFly.

Our broadcasts rights contract with Spectrum Sports Network has a built-in four percent annual increase. This contract is guaranteed through the 2025-26 school year.

Purpose of Report

The CIF post-retirement medical plan pays medical insurance premiums for the eligible group of retirees. The purpose of this report is to determine the actuarial present value of future medical insurance premiums, and to review the adequacy of the reserve fund established to pay premiums.

Covered Eligible Group

The covered group includes eight retirees and six spouses. Their average is 76. The plan is closed to other active employees.

The eligible retirees are covered in the same medical insurance plan that covers active employees. The expected annual premium for this fiscal year is \$99,960.

Reserve Fund

CIF has established a reserve fund to pay medical insurance premiums for the eligible group. The reserve fund's market value increased from \$1,793,800 to \$2,071,150 during the twelve months ending July 31. \$101,268 was withdrawn from the reserve fund during that period to reimburse CIF for medical insurance premiums. The reserve fund's investment return was approximately 21% for the twelve months. Measuring from 2012, the annualized average investment return is estimated at 8.2%. (We did not audit information on the reserve fund provided by CIF.)

Results of Actuarial Valuation

The actuarial valuation first starts with the current premiums and projects future medical insurance premiums using the health cost trend rates and mortality assumptions summarized in the Actuarial Assumptions section below. Although the premiums charged by the insurance company are not age dependent, this valuation uses premiums that are graded by age.

The actuarial present value of future retiree medical premiums is the present value of the projected premiums discounted at the reserve fund's targeted return of 6.0%. *The actuarial present value of future retiree medical premiums is \$1,505,000*.

To gauge the sensitivity of our estimate to our assumptions, the actuarial present value is recalculated by changing key assumptions. First, the future medical premium inflation was changed by +1.0% and -1.0%. Then valuations were also performed assuming future investment return of 5% instead of the targeted 6%. In the table below you can see the present value of future premiums changes by 9 to 10 percentage points for one percentage point change in premium inflation.

The reserve fund of \$2.07 million is sufficient in each of the scenarios. At the worst case among the six (low investment return and high premium inflation), the reserve fund has a surplus of \$240,000 or 13% of the value of future premiums.

This proposal revises SJS Constitution language regarding Board of Managers superintendent representation:

- A. Adds an additional Superintendent Representative.
- B. Identifies the current Superintendent Representative and the new Superintendent Representative as North and South Superintendent Representatives.
- C. Establishes terms for the positions.
- D. Outlines the process for election.

Fiscal Impact:

Rationale:

Having one Superintendent Representative for the entire Section is difficult for the dissemination of information. With the addition of a Superintendent Representative, the organization is able to split the two representatives into North and South representatives. This provides more superintendent representation and helps with the dissemination of information as our superintendent representatives would only be responsible for communicating with member superintendents within their geographical area – cuts the current responsibility almost in half.

Article 4 - Section 6

Each league in the Sac-Joaquin Section will be represented on the Board of Managers. Each league is entitled two votes and two representatives on the Board of Managers. The following representatives will be entitled to one vote: large school athletic directors representative, medium school athletic directors representative, small school athletic directors representative, school board member, and the superintendents representative-North and superintendents representative-South. The Executive Committee will only vote on items when there is a tie. A quorum shall consist of two-thirds of the membership of the Board of Managers to conduct business.

Article 4 - Section 7

League representatives and at-large representatives shall constitute the Board of Managers and shall be authorized to conduct business.

- 1. A quorum shall consist of two-thirds of the membership of the Board of Managers to conduct business.
 - a. The President to vote in case of tie.
- 2. Athletic Directors shall be elected to two-year terms, as representatives for the large, medium, and small schools of the Section.
 - a. The large schools, the medium schools and the small schools representatives shall be elected at the spring meeting of the Board of Managers.
- 3. Superintendent Representatives shall be elected to two-year terms a representative (1) from the North and a representative (1) from the South.
 - a. The North & South Superintendent Representatives shall be elected at the spring meeting of the Board of Managers.

This proposal adds two (2) At-Large Superintendent Representatives to the SJS Executive Committee; one (1) from the North member schools/districts and one (1) from the South member schools/districts.

Rationale:

The Executive Committee and staff believe that the organization needs representation from our superintendents; their global perspectives add another layer to multi-layered approach we have created providing yet another perspective to our discussions and decision making.

Section 3 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE (SAC-JOAQUIN SECTION)

- 1. The Executive Committee of the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section shall consist of the following:
 - a. Board of Managers Officers
 - i. President
 - ii. President-Elect
 - iii. Past President
 - b. Regular Members
 - i. Sac-Joaquin Athletic Director Association Representative SJADA (one)
 - ii. Area Administrator Representatives-North/South (two)
 - iii. At-Large Administrator (one)
 - iv. Area Athletic Director Representative-North or South (one)
 - v. At-Large Athletic Director Representative (one)
 - vi. At-Large Superintendent Representative-North/South (two)
- 2. Regular members of the Executive Committee shall be elected to three-year terms at the regular April meeting of the Board of Managers. The full Board of Managers shall vote for all members of the Executive Committee except for the following:
 - a. Sac-Joaquin Athletic Director Association Representative will be elected/appointed by the SJADA Board and forwarded to the Section to serve a two-year term with one (1) term renewable.
 - b. At-Large Representatives (Superintendent, Administrator & Athletic Director) will be appointed to assure a more balanced representation of the gender, ethnic composition and geographic boundaries (North/South) of the Sac-Joaquin Section.
 - i. The Executive Committee will identify and announce the needed representation.
 - ii. League representatives or individuals may make nominations accompanied by supporting qualifications and background information.
 - iii. The Executive Committee will proceed with consideration of all nominees and make an appointment to fill the needed representation.
 - iv. The appointment of the At-Large position will be for two (2) years with one (1) term renewable.
- 3. Area Representatives will be designated North & South and be elected as follows:
 - a. Administrator One representative from the northern part of the Section and one representative from the southern part of the Section.
 - b. Athletic Director One representative from either the northern part of the Section
 - c. The northern & southern part of the Section will be defined by the leagues of the Sac-Joaquin Section, as follows:
 - Northern: CAL, CVC, CVCL, DELTA, FVL, GEL, GSL, MEL, METRO, NPAC, PVL, SDL, SFL, SMAL, SVC.
 - ii. Southern: CCAA, CCAL, CCC, MLL, MLL, SJAA, SAL, TCAL, TVL, VOL, WAC.
- 4. A regular member of the Executive Committee, who has served two consecutive terms of office, will not be eligible for re-election until one year has elapsed following the second term.
- 5. With the exception of the Past-President, membership on the Executive Committee shall be confined to superintendents, assistant superintendents, district level administrators, site administrators, principals, assistant principals, vice principals and athletic directors (for athletic director's offices) who have served in these positions in an administrative capacity in a CIF Sac-Joaquin Section school/district for two or more years.
- 6. The Executive Committee shall be the administrative body of the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section, and it shall enforce rules and regulations approved by the Board of Managers of the Sac-Joaquin Section and can consider all questions related to a violation of such rules and regulations.
- 7. The Executive Committee shall hold no less than five regular meetings during the school year. These meetings shall occur at the call of the chairperson. Special meetings may be called by the Commissioner on the advice of the President.
- 8. The Commissioner shall attend all meetings of the Executive Committee and serve as its secretary.
- 9. The proceedings of the Executive Committee at each of its regular meetings shall be published and sent to all member schools of the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section.
- 10. A member of the Executive Committee may be removed from office at any regular meeting of the Board of Managers or at a special meeting called for that purpose by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Managers members present.

This proposal establishes a universal maximum air quality index number for all member schools participation (preseason, league, and postseason) in outdoor education-based athletics.

Rationale:

With the increasing exposure to poor air quality, as a result of seasonal fires, it is believed that the organization needs to establish an Air Quality Index policy that is universal and consistent across the entire Section. This is necessary for the health and safety of our student-athletes and coaches.

Bylaw 503.9 - Air Quality Index Policy (AQI)

An air quality index of less than 151 must be registered, at the beginning of the contest, for all high school outdoor athletic events hosted by SJS member schools during preseason, league, and section championship events. SJS member schools may not host outdoor contests when the AQI is equal to or greater than 151.

With the implementation of the Statewide Sportsmanship and Ejection Policy (503.M) soccer players receiving a red card due to the issuance of two yellow cards must be removed from the current game and the upcoming contest. This proposal aims to define, in the sport of soccer, a disqualification versus an ejection.

Fiscal Impact: None

Rationale: Currently the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Sport By-laws read for the sport of soccer:

2600.1 Rules

All soccer competition in the Sac-Joaquin Section will be conducted under National Federation rules unless otherwise provided herein.

- a. A player receiving a straight red card shall be ejected. Two yellow cards issued in the same game to the same player carries the same consequence as a red card.
- b. An ejected player may not play for the duration of the game and will adhere to the appropriate number of subsequent game suspensions in accordance with Bylaw 503.M (Statewide Sportsmanship and Ejection Policy).
- c. A player who receives two yellow cards in any game will be disqualified for that contest and may not play for the remainder of the game. The player will be eligible for the team's next game.
- d. A player who receives a yellow card in any game must leave the field of play and may be substituted for according to NFHS guidelines. The player may re-enter the game at any subsequent time that a legal substitution may be made.

Proposal Summary:

This proposal eliminates the realignment amendment, which has been in place since 2014, that forces Sacramento High football to compete no lower than Division III. Thus, allowing them to drop to Division IV or lower, if appropriate.

Fiscal Impact: None.

Rationale:

In 2014, Sacramento HS was moved from the Metro League (D2) into the Capital Athletic League (D3) as a result of realignment. At the time, there was concern Sacramento HS - which had very strong football and boys and girls basketball programs - could potentially fall into D4. So, a clause was inserted into the adopted realignment proposal, forcing Sacramento HS to drop no lower than D3 in those sports; this very same clause was adopted during realignment in 2018. Since then, Sacramento HS has seen its enrollment drop by more than 50% (927 to 418) and the Division IV football participants have gotten larger and more able to defend themselves. This year, Vista del Lago - a team that beat Sacramento HS football (47-33) in league play - was moved down into D4 instead of Sacramento HS.

Note: We're not including basketball in this proposal because that sport has fewer divisions, so D4 is a less-competitive field in basketball vs. football. Additionally, both of Sacramento's basketball programs can currently go no lower than D2 due to continued success.

On behalf of Sierra Academy of Expeditionary Learning and Ghidotti Early College High School (multi-school agreement) thank you for the opportunity to expand our program and reach new heights. I would like to express interest and preparedness for full membership and becoming league members. In the school year 2021/22 we enter our 4th season of Fire Wolf sports and will draw from 365 overall students between two schools (SAEL and Ghidotti). Our program was founded three years ago when a small Charter School in Nevada City (Sierra Academy) established associate membership, adding Ghidotti Early College HS as a multi-school agreement after dis-joining a multi-school agreement with Nevada Union.

During our first three years we've worked to build up our programs to include two sports per season; Fall: Girls' Volleyball, B/G Cross Country, Winter: B/G Basketball, and Spring: Boys' Volleyball, B/G Track & Field. We've offered Co-ed soccer in the winter but will not continue soccer at this time as it was challenging to field in Nevada County due to weather, lighting, and facility reasons. We are interested in adding more sports but are waiting to see if there are particular sports that will serve well if added to a particular league based on needs. Soccer (preferably Fall or Spring) and Golf would be sports that our program would readily be able to add in the future.

Over the past three years we've competed against almost all teams from the CVC, NPAC, and SMAL. I've attended league meetings with the SMAL, and spoken to many AD's and league president's about the potential of joining a league. The biggest concern from most athletic directors is the distance separating us in Nevada City to most schools in the Sacramento area. As this will be a bit of a challenge I also feel this is what's best for the program as a whole to continue pushing the program forward. Both schools' principals are in favor of joining a league and fully support the program. We have coaches in place who are committed and also encourage the move to join a league and hope to compete for playoffs in the near future.

In closing, I'm excited and anxious for the next step as it's been a lot of moving parts to "start up" a high school sports program from scratch. If we were to join a league this will add yet more responsibilities and accountability for our program as a whole. Finally, me and the student-athletes are willing and able to meet these demands and look forward to hearing back from you at your earliest convenience.

Proposal Summary: As per SJS Constitution Article 2, Section 3.A, the Board of Managers will accept nominations of one (1) principal and one (1) athletic director from each league. Voting by the BOM, for two (2) principals and one (1) athletic director from both the north and south, will take place at the October 5, 2022 BOM meeting.

SJS Constitution Article 2, Section 3.A.(1)

The realignment committee shall consist of the following: two co-chairpersons, one executive committee member, two member school principals from the north, two member school principals from the south, one athletic director from the north, one athletic director from the south, two at-large positions and the Section Commissioner. The two at-large positions can be any individual currently involved with school related matters, such as school board members, district office personnel, member school principals, athletic directors, etc. Retired school administrators who served on the Board of Managers during their tenure as a site administrator may also be selected for an at-large position. Each member league will nominate one principal and one athletic director to serve on the committee, and the Board of Managers will vote to fill the positions. A league cannot be represented by more than one person on the committee. The Executive Committee will select the two at-large positions. All individuals on the realignment committee will be voting members with the exception of the two cochairpersons and the Section Commissioner. The members of the realignment committee cannot be members of the Board of Managers, with the exception of the Executive Committee member who will not be allowed to vote on any appeals to the Board of Managers.

Nominations are due to the Section office by Friday, September 9, 2022 (nominations should include a one (1) page resume)

This year's six winners represent six different high schools, six leagues, four of the seven divisions and both halves of the Section.

Avrett is the fourth coach from Pitman High to

receive this award. Kane is the second coach from Merced High to receive this award and Winton is the second winner from Livingston High. These are the first winners from Adams Academy, Bear Creek and River City High Schools.

To date, 128 coaches have been honored from 76 different schools.

The award, honoring coaches who are positive role models within our schools and the community at large, is being given for the 21st year. Each of the six model coaches will receive a plaque and a lifetime Sac-Joaquin Section pass at the Scholarship Breakfast on April 26.

Each member school in the Sac-Joaquin Section

can nominate one male and one female coach from its staff. Those names then went to the leagues, and each league was then directed to select one male and one female coach and send those names to the Section office for consideration.

Below is a short synopsis of this year's six honorees, listed in alphabetical order:

LISA AVRETT (Pitman)

Avrett coached water polo and swimming at Johansen for 23 years, swimming at Oakdale for three years, and water polo and swimming at Pitman for the last three years.

She's also volunteers within her community with the Red Cross as she teaches and trains lifeguards and she's been a coach with Modesto-Stanislaus Water Polo for 23 years.

"Lisa's totally invested in the development of young women here at Pitman," Pitman athletic director Dave Walls said. "And as a coach has demonstrated the true qualities of trustworthiness, respect and fairness. She's invested so much of her heart and time in growing Pitman Aquatics."

KRISTIE DORNAN (River City)

Dornan has coached cross country and track and field since 2014; she also coached girls basketball for five years (2006-2010) and girls soccer for five years (2001-2005). Her girls basketball teams won two league championships during her tenure.

In addition to that, she has been a member of the peer mediation team (10 years), school safety team (two years), PBTS Team (two years) and was the WASC Chair for two years. She's been a class advisor for four years.

"Kristie is a natural born leader of student-athletes and staff," River City athletic director Matthew Powell said. "Her unlimited energy and sacrifice to help and care for River City's students' well-being in unmatched.

"She goes above and beyond for everything here at River City, attacking every aspect of her life with great enthusiasm."

IOHN KANE (Merced)

Kane currently coaches girls golf (since 2014), softball (since 2017) and is an assistant for boys basketball (since 2012). Previously, he coached at Atwater; varsity boys basketball for 12 years, freshman softball for four years, JV baseball for four years and freshman football for two years. In girls golf, he was named the Merced Sun-Star coach of the year in 2018 and was the 2020-21 SJS Coach of the Year. While at Atwater, he won an award for championing the inclusion of students with disabilities.

He volunteers as a youth coach in his community with basketball, baseball and softball.

"John is always teaching his athletes and students on all six pillars of character," Merced athletic director Paul Hogue said. "I do not worry about Coach Kane and his programs. His kids carry themselves with class and respect for him and our school."

KIRK KLUCZNIK (Bear Creek)

Kirk has coached girls volleyball for 28 years and softball for 24 years. During his time at Bear Creek, he's seen his teams win a combined 15 league titles and the volleyball team has a current league winning streak of 53 matches.

He developed the Rivals Unite Softball Tournament for the last eight years, during which time he's raised \$55,000 for the local Breast Cancer Foundation. He's worked with the Special Olympics for four years.

BRELYNN SHIREY (John Adams Academy)

Shirey has coached girls volleyball, girls basketball and boys volleyball at Adams Academy for the last six years each. Her girls basketball team was the 2016-17 academic team champion and her 2019-20 girls volleyball team was the NPAC champion.

She's been the Adams Academy service project chaperone since 2016, helping coordinate work with Feed my Starving Children, Acres of Hope and Winter Gala.

"I cannot remember a season of basketball or volleyball where I didn't learn something from Coach Bre," Kailee Beloberk, one of her players, said. "She taught our teams lessons in humility, loving others, using our voices for good and supporting one another."

MATT WINTON (Livingston)

Winton has coached baseball for 29 years, football for 15 years, girls golf for 14 years and boys golf for one year. He's won five league coach of the year titles in baseball and girls golf, both sports where he is still active.

He's provided a free youth baseball clinic in Lvivingston for the last 19 years, served for four years on the Livingston Recreation Commission, and has been the Block L Advisor for five years.

"Matt's enthusiasm and love for coaching is exemplified in his interaction with all his players," Hilmar girls golf coach Ty Pettigrew said. "He understands how to use

National Coaches of the Year Focused on Education-based Philosophies

It is hard to imagine that any profession is more important and has had as significant of an impact on other people than the high school coaching profession.

Memories from participating in high school sports more often than not involve coaches – men and women who not only helped us learn and play our particular sports better, and have fun doing so, but who, in many cases, helped us navigate through that stretch of life.

And along with health-care workers, teachers and other individuals who work with young people, we all should be indebted to high school coaches for their additional time and effort the past two years. In addition to their normal busy schedules, these individuals have faced numerous additional burdens related to the pandemic.

It is indeed one of the highlights of the year when the NFHS has the opportunity to recognize some of these individuals who have devoted their lives to coaching high school sports.

Earlier this week, the NFHS recognized more than 650 individuals for their efforts as high school coaches during the 2020-21 school year, including 23 as National Coaches of the Year. As you might imagine with individuals selected for this honor, their accomplishments are amazing.

The 23 coaches selected for this national honor have led their respective teams to a combined 116 state championships. While four of the coaches won their first state title this past year, several others have won 10-15 state championships.

Specifically, Ron Insinger is the winningest high school boys basketball coach in Pennsylvania history. Jeffrey Howard has won 10 Ohio boys state cross country titles – most in state history. Jesse Nelson retired as the winningest girls basketball coach in Kansas history. John Dwyer won his 12th Illinois state lacrosse championship with a perfect 25-0 record. Kristin Liles has led her teams to 11 state girls tennis titles in Oklahoma.

While the accomplishments of these five individuals, along with the other 18, are extraordinary, the state titles, career victories and perfect records are not the only defining measures of success – far from it in fact. Responses by these individuals to the "Coaching Philosophy" section of the nomination form reveals what is really important in education-based athletics.

Kit Harris, the boys and girls wrestling coach as Baldwin High School in Baldwin City, Kansas, who led his team to the 2021 Kansas State High School Activities Association Girls Wrestling State Championship, said "to be successful at something is meaningless unless you are a good person along the way." He

stresses the 5C's – character, competing, citizenship, classroom commitment and community.

Insinger, who has won 984 games as boys basketball coach at Loyalsock
Township High School in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, said, "My philosophy has
always been to strive to make each student-athlete a better person than they
were at the beginning of each season. The wins and championships are a bonus. If
I enhanced each player's integrity by the end of each season, we were all winners!
For me the 'score' that matters most is the one that measures their effort and
ultimately only they know the score."

Samuel "Bunky" Colvin, boys soccer coach at McIntosh High School in Peachtree City, Georgia, who has a 400-58 record and seven state championships, reveals his key to success: "I firmly believe that if all we do is win titles, we have not fulfilled our duty as coaches. The most valuable thing players should receive from participation in soccer is a staff devoted to helping players become the best students and people they can become. We are in the business of creating leaders who will impact the world for good. Winning games will always come second to helping our young men to prepare to win in life."

Linda Drust, the Girls Spirit Coach of the Year from Cartersville (Illinois) High School, certainly understands her mission as a high school coach: "It is my philosophy to facilitate opportunities through my position as cheer coach that will prepare my team for immediate success as well as opportunities for success after high school. I coach my athletes for a short time in their life, and accepting that I have an opportunity to enhance their experience to be better students, spouses, parents and people is my core value for being a coach."

And perhaps the most direct philosophy comes from the Girls Softball Coach of the Year, Ed McQuade, of Greenway High School in Phoenix, Arizona,

"My coaching philosophy is simple and easily duplicated: FOCUS ON CHARACTER - wins and losses will take care of themselves."

These are but a few of the amazing individuals selected as NFHS National Coaches of the Year for 2020-21 – all of whom have impacted student-athletes in positive ways for decades.

In addition to these 23 individuals, we salute all of this nation's high school coaches for the extra burdens they are continuing to carry during these challenging times. They deserve our utmost respect and appreciation.

NFHS-NFL Football Initiatives, Multiple Sport Participants in Super Bowl

The week leading up to the Super Bowl gains the attention of millions across the globe. Many are anticipating the actual match-up between the best professional football teams in the world, while others are looking forward to the unveiling of new television commercials or hosting watch parties.

At the high school level, it is an opportunity to showcase the value of all high school sports and activities, including football, and to evaluate the health and wellness – and ensure the growth – of these programs moving forward.

Earlier this week, the NFHS and the NFL announced another step in their partnership aimed at promoting the growth, understanding and support for football at the high school level with the debut of "Football Tackling," a new free course offered through the NFHS Learning Center.

The course is designed to assist interscholastic coaches in teaching, evaluating and programming proper tackling techniques and is the latest project resulting from the NFHS-NFL partnership that was announced in September 2020.

Ed Passino, senior consultant for high school football promotion who was hired to lead the partnership, said "coaching education and player protection are primary pillars of the NFHS-NFL partnership, and this tackle course exemplifies that commitment. This course provides coaches a lens to not only teach and evaluate tackling, but it also delivers concepts to best develop confidence in players through appropriate contact load management, skill instruction and progression guidelines."

In addition to the football tackling course, the NFHS and NFL have been studying participation trends, and striving to increase confidence in students and parents that the sport is, in fact, more focused on risk minimization than ever before.

And while the NFHS and the NFL have been working together to enhance the long-term viability of football – both for the million students who compete in the sport annually and the three to five percent who will continue to play at higher levels – the NFHS continues to promote the value of competing in as many sports and activity programs as possible.

The journey to the Super Bowl for most of the participants in this weekend's game began in high school – but not just on the football field on Friday nights. Contrary to what many people think, arriving on the world's biggest football stage did not begin by playing the sport year-round. Instead, they became some of the sport's top prospects by playing multiple sports in high school.

Several of the players in Super Bowl LVI participated in three high school sports, topped by Bengals' quarterback Joe Burrow. As a senior at Athens High

School in The Plains, Ohio, Burrow won Mr. Football honors in Ohio, was first-team all-state as a point guard on the basketball team and also participated in track and field.

Bengals' wide receiver Tyler Boyd was a three-sport (football, basketball, baseball) standout at Clairton (Pennsylvania) High School, which included leading the football team to a 63-1 record in four years. Rams' wide receiver Odell Beckham Jr. participated in football, basketball, and track and field — and drumline — at Isidore Newman High School in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Many others were two-sport stars, including Rams' quarterback Matthew Stafford, who teamed with Los Angeles Dodgers' pitcher Clayton Kershaw in football and baseball at Highland Park High School in Dallas. Stafford's top receiver Cooper Kupp, who in addition to playing football at Davis High School in Yakima, Washington, helped the school's basketball team to the Washington Interscholastic Activities Association Class 4A Championship as a senior.

In addition, the eight quarterbacks who reached the divisional round of the NFL playoffs played a total of 24 sports in high school, including Tennessee's Ryan Tannehill, who was a four-sport standout at Big Spring (Texas) High School.

Playing multiple sports in high school is truly a winning formula. In addition to enhancing chances for a college scholarship and playing a sport at the highest level, there are innumerable benefits for the 95 percent of high school athletes who will not play at higher levels.

Multiple-sport participants have a reduced risk of overuse injuries, are able to learn from multiple coaches, participate in cross-training which leads to better athleticism, have better mental development and teamwork skills, and have a reduced chance of burnout in sports. Further, students can enjoy multiple

activities concurrently, such as participation on a sports team while also belonging to a performing arts group.

Whether the goal is to participate in high school sports and activities to have fun with their peers, or to achieve a college athletic scholarship, or to be a lifelong participant, the best route to achieving a successful, healthy balance in life is to participate in multiple sports and other activities.

And for some individuals recently, the games have not been enjoyable. In the past few months, following are some of the unfortunate incidents that have occurred at the high school level:

• The mayor of a city was ejected from his daughter's high school basketball game after threatening a referee.

- A volleyball official was followed off the court by a coach who was shouting obscenities.
- A referee was assaulted and knocked unconscious during a basketball tournament.
- A student from the opposing school in the stands shouted racist comments at a high school basketball player on the court.
- At another game in another state, inappropriate chants were made against the opposing team's players on the court.
- While it was at a lower level, continued poor parent behavior in the stands led a Central New York youth basketball league to end the season early.

Unfortunately, the list could go on and on. When hearing accounts like these and many others that regularly occur, the primary reason for the current officials' shortage becomes painfully obvious – unacceptable behavior on the part of coaches, parents and other spectators.

While all of these displays of unacceptable behavior must stop, the recent occurrences of students and other spectators using hurtful, demeaning and hateful language at individuals on the opposing team is heartbreaking.

High school sports and other activities exist to lift people up, not demean or tear people down. The goal is to treat everyone equally and treat each other with respect. Any speech or harassment that is insulting, demeaning or hurtful will not be tolerated.

High schools must establish a culture that values the worth of every single person – both players on the school's team and players on the opposing team.

There must be a no-tolerance policy regarding behavior that shows disrespect for another individual.

Likewise, the accounts of violent attacks against officials are incomprehensible and must be stopped. As Dana Pappas, NFHS director of officiating services, said, "Do you really think that these individuals who are volunteers are going to take a half-day off of work, get paid less than they're probably making at their real job to go and be unfair in a game? It doesn't make sense. They are there to give back. They are there to be community servants."

NFHS playing rules are written to encourage sportsmanship. Participation in these programs should promote respect, integrity and sportsmanship. However, for these ideals to occur, everyone involved must do their part.

Because of a concern that unsporting behavior in education-based athletics has increased the past year, the NFHS has made sportsmanship the No. 1 Point of Emphasis in all sports for the 2022-23 season.

And if there was ever a doubt, the recent unfortunate events at the college level should make it crystal clear that the person most responsible for setting the tone at high school athletic contests is the coach(es).

If coaches act in a sportsmanlike manner, their behavior sets the tone for players, spectators and others. If coaches, however, are constantly complaining about the decision of contest officials, spectators are more likely to do the same.

There must be a collaborative, working relationship between contest officials and game administration to promote good sportsmanship and safely conduct the contest. Everyone has their roles to play in creating a positive, sportsmanlike atmosphere at contests.

Officials should focus on the actions of players, coaches and other bench/sideline personnel. A positive, open line of communication between officials and coaches ultimately results in a better contest for everyone involved.

Contest officials, however, should never engage with spectators who are exhibiting unsporting behavior. Once the contest begins, school administration is responsible for dealing with unruly spectators. A proactive approach by school administration includes monitoring the behavior of spectators and intervening as needed.

If spectators are using demeaning or profane language at officials – or at others in the stands – those individuals must be removed from the contest by school administration.

Rather than spectators like the ones described above, more **fans** are needed at high school sporting events. Fans support the officials, the players and the coaches, unlike the **fanatics** who tear down and do harm to the participants, the school and the community.

Good sports win with humility, lose with grace and do both with dignity. It takes the efforts of everyone every day to ensure that sportsmanship remains one of the top priorities in education-based activity programs.

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (January 18, 2022)— Twenty-three high school coaches from across the country have been selected as 2020-21 National Coaches of the Year by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Coaches Association.

The NFHS, which has been recognizing coaches through an awards program since 1982, honors coaches in the top 10 girls sports and top 10 boys sports (by participation numbers), and in two "other" sports – one for boys and one for girls – that are not included in the top 10 listings. The NFHS also recognizes a spirit coach as a separate award category. Winners of NFHS awards must be active coaches during the year for which they receive their award. This year's awards recognize coaches for the 2020-21 school year.

Recipients of the 2020-21 national awards for boys sports are: John Adair, baseball, Malakoff (Texas) High School; Ron Insinger, basketball, Williamsport (Pennsylvania) Loyalsock Township Senior High School; Jeffrey Howard, cross country, Peninsula (Ohio) Woodridge High School; Rob Zimmerman, 11-player football, DeWitt (Michigan) High School; Holly Lester, golf, Gilbert (Iowa) High School; Samuel "Bunky" Colvin, soccer, Peachtree City (Georgia) McIntosh High School; Christopher Verity, swimming and diving, Endwell (New York) Maine-Endwell High School; Tom O'Brien, tennis,

Kansas City (Missouri) Barstow School; Larry Topp, track and field, Minster (Ohio) Local Schools; and Mike Simons, wrestling, Springfield (Oregon) Thurston High School.

The recipients of the 2020-21 NFHS national awards for girls sports are: Jesse Nelson, basketball, Olpe (Kansas) High School; Stanley Johnson, cross country, Moulton (Alabama) Lawrence County High School; Leonard Kull, golf, Washington (Iowa) High School; John Dwyer, lacrosse, Wilmette (Illinois) Loyola Academy; John Hanley, soccer, San Jose (California) Archbishop Mitty High School; Ed McQuade, softball, Phoenix (Arizona) Greenway High School; Stefanie Kerska, swimming and diving, Ann Arbor (Michigan) Pioneer High School; Kristin Liles, tennis, Tulsa (Oklahoma) Cascia Hall Prep School; Dori Whitford, track and field, Spokane (Washington) Mead High School; and Jean LaClair, volleyball, Bronson (Michigan) High School.

The recipient of the National Coach of the Year Award for spirit is **Linda Drust** of Cartersville (Illinois) High School. **Robert Vance Jones**, a 6-player football coach at Balmorhea (Texas) High School, was chosen in the "other" category for boys sports, and **Kit Harris**, a girls wrestling coach at Baldwin High School in Baldwin City, Kansas, was chosen in the "other" category for girls sports.

The NFHS receives nominations from its member state associations, which often works with the state coaches' association in its respective state. The state association then contacts the potential state award recipients to complete a coach profile form that requests information regarding the coach's record, membership in and affiliation with coaching and other professional organizations, involvement with other school and community activities and programs, and coaching philosophy. To be approved as an award recipient and considered for sectional and national coach of the year consideration, this profile form must be completed by the coach or designee and then approved by the executive director (or designee) of the state athletic/activities association.

The next award level after state coach of the year is sectional coach of the year. The NFHS is divided into eight geographical sections. They are as follows: Section 1 – Northeast (CT, ME, MA, NH, NJ, NY, RI, VT); Section 2 – Mideast (DE, DC, KY, MD, OH, PA, VA, WV); Section 3 – South (AL, FL, GA, LA, MS, NC, SC, TN); Section 4 – Central (IL, IN, IA, MI, WI); Section 5 – Midwest (KS, MN, MO, NE, ND, SD); Section 6 – Southwest (AR, CO, NM, OK, TX); Section 7 – West (AZ, CA, HI, NV, UT); and Section 8 – Northwest (AK, ID, MT, OR, WA, WY).

The NFHS Coaches Association has an advisory committee composed of a chair and eight sectional representatives. The sectional committee representatives evaluate the state award recipients

from the states in their respective sections and select the best candidates for the sectional award in each sport category. The NFHS Coaches Association Advisory Committee then considers the sectional candidates in each sport, ranks them according to a point system, and determines a national winner for each of the 20 sport categories, the spirit category and two "other" categories.

A total of 660 coaches will be recognized this year with state, sectional and national awards.

Following are biographical sketches of the 23 NFHS National High School Coaches of the Year for 2020-21:

COACHES OF THE YEAR - BOYS SPORTS

Baseball John Adair Malakoff, Texas

John Adair retired following the 2021 season, closing the book on a 32-year high school baseball coaching career that comprised more than 600 victories at four different schools, and 20 coach-of-the-year awards from the county, district, regional and state levels. In his final season, Adair's Malakoff High School squad achieved a storybook ending for their longtime coach, claiming the University Interscholastic League 3A state championship on the strength of a 38-7 record. Adair has been a member of the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association (THSBCA) throughout his entire high school coaching career and has served as its president since 2020. He also spent two years as THSBCA 1st Vice President, one year as assistant secretary, three years as a regional director and six years as a poll director for the 1A to 3A classifications. Adair, who has also coached football and boys and girls basketball at both the junior high and high school levels, refers to his coaching program as "The Spring Training of Life" and strives to instill positive traits in young people to help them become successful and productive adults.

Basketball

Ron Insinger

Williamsport, Pennsylvania

Ron Insinger is the all-time winningest high school boys basketball coach in Pennsylvania history, having amassed 984 career victories – and counting – over 47 seasons at Loyalsock Township Senior High School (LTSHS) in Williamsport. While Insinger's legendary run at Loyalsock includes 38 20-

win seasons, 30 league titles, 24 district titles, and 30 coach-of-the-year honors from various outlets, his first state championship did not come until this past season when his Loyalsock Lancers capped a 27-1 campaign with the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association 3A state title. In addition to earning inductions into the West Branch Valley Hall of Fame (2010), Pennsylvania Basketball Hall of Fame (2012), Pennsylvania State Sports Hall of Fame (2017) and Lock Haven University Hall of Fame (2020), Insinger has been lauded by the state Senate and House of Representatives on several occasions for his outstanding service to the game of basketball and to the youth of the Commonwealth. Insinger has also been director of athletics at LTSHS for the past 16 years, and has coached boys soccer, boys and girls track and field, and girls basketball at different times throughout his tenure.

Cross Country Jeffrey Howard Peninsula, Ohio

Jeffrey Howard has built a cross country dynasty at Peninsula (Ohio) Woodridge High School. In 28 seasons, he has led the Bulldogs to 12 Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) Division II state championships (10 boys, 2 girls), claimed 34 conference championships (17/17) and mentored 51 All-Ohioans (37/14) and 230 state meet qualifiers (116/114). His 10 OHSAA boys state titles, which include stretches of five in a row from 2006 to 2010 and three in a row from 2018 to 2020, are the most for any boys program in state history. His boys teams have won 12 district championships and 12 regional championships and have set the record for lowest combined state meet score, twice. Howard has been boys Metro Athletic Conference coach of the year 18 times, including the past 17 years in a row, and has received the same honor from the Akron Touchdown Club (eight times), OHSAA/Ohio Association of Track and Cross Country Coaches (OATCCC) (seven times) and the NFHS (Ohio – three times, Section 2 – 2010). As a result of his outstanding resume, Howard was inducted into the OATCCC Hall of Fame with the class of 2018.

Football, 11-player Rob Zimmerman DeWitt, Michigan In his 26th coaching season, Rob Zimmerman guided the DeWitt (Michigan) High School football team to an undefeated 12-0 season and a Michigan High School Athletic Association Division 3 state championship – his first title in five championship game appearances. DeWitt's sensational season brought a slew of coach-of-the-year (COY) honors for Zimmerman – 10 total – including the *USA Today* State of Michigan Coach of the Year, Detroit Lions Coach of the Year, three different state COY awards from the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association (MHSFCA) and a runner-up finish for the NFL Don Shula National Coach of the Year award. Counting his 2020 accolade, Zimmerman has been named MHSFCA regional COY 14 times since 2000 and won the *Lansing State Journal* "Coach of the Decade" distinction for the 2000s. He has turned DeWitt football into one of the most prominent programs in the state with 19 conference championships in his 23 seasons at DHS – including the past 16 in a row – 14 district championships and 12 regional championships. His teams have performed exceptionally well in the classroom, too, receiving 1st team academic all-state honors in each of the past nine seasons.

Golf Holly Lester Gilbert, Iowa

Holly Lester's 34th season as the Gilbert (Iowa) High School (GHS) boys golf coach was a display of pure dominance, as her squad won all 15 of its competitive meets (12 regular season, three tournaments), including the program's first-ever lowa High School Athletic Association Class 3A state championship. The Tigers' stellar campaign resulted in Lester's seventh coach-of-the-year (COY) honor from the Raccoon River Conference, as well as a COY award from the Iowa High School Golf Coaches Association. In addition to seven conference championships, Lester's teams have won eight sectional championships and four district championships and have posted seven top-five finishes in nine state tournament appearances. Lester started both the boys and girls golf programs at Gilbert in 1988 – opting to focus solely on boys golf beginning with the 1999 season – and has previously coached GHS softball and volleyball during her lengthy career. She also currently coaches winter cheer and girls basketball at Gilbert Middle School, and has drawn on her experience at different levels of coaching to develop her coaching philosophy, which is focused on valuing and preparing all athletes for competition regardless of their skill level.

Soccer

Samuel "Bunky" Colvin

Peachtree City, Georgia

Samuel "Bunky" Colvin, of Peachtree City (Georgia) McIntosh High School, has been a high school soccer coach for 26 years, including the past 22 years as a head coach. Colvin has been awarded numerous coach-of-the-year awards at various distinctions including three national awards, two regional awards and 16 state-level awards. In addition to leading his team to seven state championships, he has amassed a record of 400 wins and just 58 losses, including a 22-1 record this past season. Also an American Government teacher at McIntosh, Colvin holds a master's degree in educational leadership and was named McIntosh teacher of the year in 2004 where he has served as a mentor teacher and a supervising teacher for student teachers.

Swimming and Diving Christopher Verity Endwell, New York

Christopher Verity, of Endwell (New York) Maine-Endwell High School, has been a varsity high school swimming and diving coach since 1993. First at Johnson City High School, Verity led the boys program until 2009 while also coaching the girls team from 2006 until 2010. At Maine-Endwell, Verity began as an assistant in 2010 and has led the boys program at Maine-Endwell since 2015. He also assumed the position of head coach for the girls program in 2011 where he continues to lead both teams. Since 2003, at least one individual or relay team from Verity's teams have advanced to the New York State Public High School Athletic Association Boys Swimming and Diving State Championships each season (41 different qualifiers). Verity has also led his teams to five state championships.

Tennis

Tom O'Brien

Kansas City, Missouri

Tom O'Brien, of Kansas City (Missouri) Barstow School, has been a high school tennis coach since 1978, including stints as the Barstow School girls and boys coach since 2006 and 2008, respectively. First at Hickman Mills High School, O'Brien served as the junior varsity basketball coach (1973-80), head golf coach (1975-2005) and head girls tennis coach (1978-2004). While at Barstow, O'Brien's teams have been perennial contenders and have accumulated more than 325 wins, which

includes several state tournament appearances and championships. In 2013, he was named both the Coach of the Year for Missouri and the NFHS Sectional Coach of the Year (Midwest Section).

Track and Field Larry Topp Minster, Ohio

Larry Topp, of Minster (Ohio) Local Schools, has been a high school boys track and field coach for more than 40 seasons. Topp was the recipient of the Ohio Association of Track and Cross County Coaches 2021 Coach of the Year Award, and he received a similar honor in 2012 when he was selected as the 2012 Fred Dafler State Coach of the Year for Ohio. Locally, Topp has been tabbed for 15 track league coach-of-the-year awards with the most recent coming in 2021. In cross country, Topp was named as a league coach of the year 13 times, most recently in 2021. Topp is a retired teacher, an active bus driver and also continues to coach cross country.

Wrestling Mike Simons Springfield, Oregon

Mike Simons, of Springfield (Oregon) Thurston High School, has been a high school wrestling coach for 25 years, including the last 18 at Thurston. Simons has made a push to increase participation numbers, and he now has about 80 wrestlers – 45 boys and 35 girls – attending practice each day. Since 2018, the Thurston boys team has finished among the top four teams at the state championships, and the Thurston girls program has an active streak of four consecutive state championships. Simons has collected a record of 312 wins with just 76 losses. He was named the 2019 NFHS Coach of the Year for girls wrestling in Oregon, as well as the sectional honor. In 2013, Simons – through fundraising and community involvement – established the Thurston Middle School boys and girls wrestling program.

COACHES OF THE YEAR - GIRLS SPORTS

Basketball Jesse Nelson Olpe, Kansas

Jesse Nelson ended his outstanding 44-year high school coaching career in grand style, leading the Olpe High School girls basketball team to a perfect 25-0 record and the Kansas State High School

Activities Association Class IA Girls Basketball Championship. Nelson retired in May 2021 as the all-time winningest basketball coach – girls or boys – in Kansas state history with 951 wins and 111 losses – an amazing winning mark of 89.5 percent. Nelson earned five KSHSAA state championships and registered five undefeated seasons. His teams appeared in the state tournament 30 times and won 31 league championships. Nelson also won 394 games as the district's junior high girls basketball coach, and he also coached junior high and high school girls track and field. Nelson was the 2014 USA Today America's Girls Basketball Coach National Champion and the 2016 McDonald's All-American Team head coach. This past year, he was named coach of the year by the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association.

Cross Country Stanley Johnson Moulton, Alabama

In addition to coaching girls cross country at Lawrence County High School in Moulton, Alabama, Johnson also coaches boys cross country as well as junior high girls and boys cross country. He has led his teams to eight Alabama High School Athletic Association (AHSAA) boys state cross country championships and seven AHSAA girls state titles for a total of 15 overall championships. Johnson's teams have finished as state runner-up eight other times. On three occasions – 2003, 2014 and 2015 – his boys and girls teams have claimed state titles the same year. Johnson has involved his teams in numerous community service projects during his 31 years coaching the sport. He uses cross country as a means of reaching out to any student who is willing to "buy-in" to the program and to become a well-rounded person. He uses the sport to "enhance a child's life and to help bring revenue to our community. My theme is 'not no, but how.'"

Golf

Leonard Kull

Washington, lowa

Leonard Kull has been a teacher, coach and official in Iowa for more than 50 years. In addition to coaching football and wrestling, Kull coaches girls golf and has led his teams to six Iowa girls golf state championships. He has been selected Iowa Class 4 Coach of the Year four times (2008, 2015, 2016, 2018), and he has been honored as district coach of the year 12 times. In addition to coaching

three sports, Kull has been a science and chemistry teacher, as well as a contest official. Kull officiated baseball and softball from 1972 to 1995, and he has officiated volleyball since 1995. He has been a member of the Washington Officials Association since 1972, including a term as president. Kull said he considered coaching young people to be "an absolute privilege. Golf is an individual game, but I found that if team members concentrated on team successes before individual accomplishments, individual success took care of itself."

Lacrosse John Dwyer

Wilmette, Illinois

John Dwyer has coached the girls lacrosse team at Loyola Academy in Wilmette, Illinois, to 12 state championships in his 21 years at the school, including nine consecutive titles at one stretch. His team won the 2021 state title with a perfect 25-0 record, a team that included his oldest granddaughter. Dwyer's overall record in 21 years is 445 victories and 61 losses — a winning mark of 87 percent. His 2021 undefeated team was ranked No. 8 in the final USA Lacrosse Magazine poll and No. 4 in the final MaxPreps poll. Dywer has been selected coach of the year two times by the Illinois High School Women's Lacrosse Association. More than 100 of Dwyer's players have advanced to college lacrosse, and he has coached all six of his children at some point during his career. Dwyer has been a member of the Illinois High School Women's Lacrosse Association for 17 years, and he is a former member of the NFHS Girls Lacrosse Rules Committee.

Soccer John Hanley San Jose, California

John Hanley has coached high school girls soccer for 26 years and has compiled a 450-67 career record. Currently the girls soccer coach at Archbishop Mitty High School in San Jose, California, Hanley has led his teams to nine California Interscholastic Federation-Central Coast Section (CIF-CCS) championships, including eight at Archbishop Mitty since taking over the program in 2007. Hanley previously coached at Bishop O'Dowd High School in Oakland, California, and led that school to its first girls soccer CIF-North Coast Section championship. Hanley has been an associate national staff coach with the United Soccer Coaches (formerly NSCAA) since 1999. He also serves as a coach educator for

USC, organizing and running courses ranging from fundamentals of soccer coaching to special courses. Hanley was named high school coach of the year twice by the San Jose Mercury News, and he was CCS Coach of the Year twice by Prep2Prep.com. Last year, he was a CIF-CCS Honor Coach.

Softball

Ed McQuade

Phoenix, Arizona

For more than 40 years, Ed McQuade has led the Phoenix (Arizona) Greenway High School softball program to nearly 900 wins and five state championships. McQuade has led his teams to the Arizona Interscholastic Association (AIA) state tournament in 39 of 41 seasons and been named AIA State Softball Coach of the Year five times. He currently serves on the AIA Softball Advisory Committee after previously serving from 2013 to 2018. McQuade, who is a member of the Arizona High School Athletic Coaches Hall of Fame, has guided 56 players to 36 different four-year universities, including three who are current Division I head coaches.

Swimming and Diving

Stefanie Kerska

Ann Arbor, Michigan

Stefanie Kerska has been the head coach of the Ann Arbor (Michigan) Pioneer High School girls swimming and diving program since 2015 (she has also led the boys program since 2014). In that short time, she has led the two programs to three Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) state championships, including back-to-back girls titles in 2020 and 2021. She was named MHSAA Swimming Coach of the Year for both girls and boys in 2021. Prior to coming to Pioneer, Kerska was an assistant coach at the University of Michigan and was a member of the USA Swimming National Team coaching staff from 2008 to 2016.

Tennis

Kristen Liles

Tulsa, Oklahoma

In 2021, Kristen Liles led the Tulsa (Oklahoma) Cascia Hall Prep School boys and girls tennis teams to Oklahoma Secondary School Activities Association (OSSAA) state championships, bringing her total of state titles to 11 during her 18-year coaching career. The Tulsa World and the OSSAA named Liles the Girls Coach of the Year for 2021, and the Oklahoma Coaches Association named her the Class

4A Boys Tennis Coach of the Year. In addition to team championships, Liles has guided 21 girls and 26 boys to individuals state championships. She is a member of the Oklahoma Tennis Coaches Association and has been elected to its Advisory Board five times.

Track and Field
Dori Whitford
Spokane, Washington

Since 1986, Dori Whitford has led the girls track and field program at Spokane (Washington) Mead High School with a simple motto: "Focus on working hard, doing our best and having fun, and the winning will take care of itself." It's a motto that helped Whitford lead Mead to a 2010 Washington Interscholastic Activities Association (WIAA) Class 4A girls state championship, and to success in numerous other sports as well. In addition to track and field, she has coached the cross country team since 2006 and earned her league's Cross Country Coach of the Year honor in 2020. Whitford is also a fixture in the local track community, organizing and directing multiple races and meets in the Spokane area.

Volleyball Jean LaClair Bronson, Michigan

Jean LaClair has led the Bronson (Michigan) High School volleyball program since 2000, garnering more than 1,200 wins and five Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) state championships. Behind LaClair's leadership, Bronson won four consecutive championships from 2015 to 2018. Her honors include the Michigan High School Coaches Association (MHSCA) Volleyball Coach of the Year in 2010, a finalist for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Coach of the Year in 2011 and the 2019 MHSAA Allen W. Bush Award. As Bronson's athletic director, LaClair has served as an National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) Delegate twice and earned the NIAAA State Award of Merit in 2019.

COACHES OF THE YEAR – OTHER SPORTS

Girls Spirit Linda Drust Cartersville, Illinois When Linda Drust left competitive cheer in 1987 to further her career in school administration, she knew she would coach again. And she likely saved her best for her second stint. Since returning in 2011, and becoming head coach in 2012, Drust has had Cartersville (Illinois) High School contending each year for a state championship. After qualifying for six-consecutive Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Competitive Cheer State Finals, Drust and her Cartersville squad won the championship in 2019-20. The win was one of three team championships guided by Drust during her career. In 2020 and 2021, Cartersville captured back-to-back IHSA Sectional Championships. In 2019, Cartersville came up just short (.04 points) of winning the Illinois Cheerleading Coaches Association (ICCA) Championship. Drust has been a member of ICCA since she returned to coaching 2011. She is also one of the original board members of the Illinois High School Cheerleading Coaches Association (IHSCCO), and is in her third year as co-mentor chair. In that officer role, Drust is responsible for organizing and facilitating a statewide mentoring program, which currently includes more than 20 new coaches.

Boys Other – 6-Player Football Robert Vance Jones Balmorhea, Texas

For 51 years, Vance Jones has walked the sidelines of high school gridirons as a coach, amassing more than 175 victories. In January 2021, he helped bring Balmorhea (Texas) High School its first state championship when his Bears defeated Richland Springs, 74-38, in the University Interscholastic League (UIL) Conference 1A Six-Man Division 2 State Championship. With the win, Jones became the third coach in UIL history to win state championships at three different schools, joining Pete Shotwell (Abilene, Breckenridge and Longview) and Terry Cron (Bartlett, Mart and Commerce). Jones, who was named the 2020 Texas Six-Man Division 2 Coach of the Year, has four state championships to his name. His first came with Sanderson High School in 1976, and later in back-to-back seasons (2009, 2010) with Garden City High School. His coaching prowess also helped him earn Texas Six-Man Division 1 Coach of the Year honors during his two-year title run with Garden City. In 2020, the Texas Six-Man Coaches Association – of which Jones is also a member – inducted him into its hall of fame. Jones has previously served as a member of the Texas Girls Coaches Association and Texas High School Coaches Association.

Kit Harris Other – Girls Wrestling Baldwin City, Kansas The illustrious 28-year coaching tenure of Kit Harris ramped up in 1999 when he assumed head wrestling coach duties at his alma mater, Baldwin High School, in Baldwin City, Kansas. Upon departing Class 6A Washburn Rural High School, Harris grew Baldwin into a perennial power in both boys and girls wrestling. In only the second year it was offered, Baldwin won the 2021 Kansas State High School Activities Association (KSHSAA) Girls Wrestling State Championship. In 2015, Harris was at the helm of a squad that captured the KSHSAA Boys Wrestling State Championship. The two team titles are accompanied by the eight individual state champions, 17 state finalists and 56 state placers coached by Harris. His career includes 271 all-time victories, in addition to recognition as a five-time Lawrence Journal-World Coach of the Year (2002, 2007, 2008, 2015, 2021) and three-time KSHSAA Class 4A Coach of the Year (2002, 2015, 2021). On three occasions (2007, 2015, 2021), Harris was also honored as the Kansas Coaches Association Coach of the Year and NFHS Midwest Section Coach of the Year. Harris has served as the Team Kansas Cadet Freestyle/Greco Coach for seven years, in addition to three terms as Kansas Wrestling Coaches Association (KWCA) president. USA Today named him a finalist for its "Most Caring Coach in America" award in 2015.

NFHS to Host First-Ever Women and Sport Leadership Virtual Summit in May

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (February 1, 2022) —In pursuit of the continued advancement of educational and competitive opportunities for women in sports, the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) is hosting its first-ever Better Together: Women and Sport Leadership Virtual Summit on May 1-3.

The three-day virtual event features discussion from influential female leaders at all three levels of sport. It is designed to develop meaningful, actionable solutions to continue the growth of women in sports through coaching, officiating and administration.

"Title IX's passage nearly 50 years ago served as the flagship legislation for the growth of high school girls athletic programs," said Dr. Karissa Niehoff, NFHS CEO. "The Better Together: Women and Sport Leadership Virtual Summit strives to build on that growth, assisting attendees in connecting the skills learned in activities to those associated with being an effective leader."

Through the virtual summit, participants can also expect to learn how to identify and articulate their personal strengths; identify gender stereotypes that create barriers; understand the importance of mentorship; and understand the value of advocating for other women.

Niehoff opens the virtual summit and its "Breaking Down Barriers" session at 6 p.m. Eastern time on Sunday, May 1. She will be joined during the three days by fellow featured speakers **Dr. Jen**

Welter, the first female NFL coach and a sports psychologist; Betsy Butterick, a communication specialist and former collegiate and professional basketball coach; and Violet Palmer, a retired collegiate and professional basketball official who now serves as the NBA Referee Operations Manager and is the coordinator of women's basketball officials for the Big Sky, Pac-12, Western Athletic and West Coast Conferences.

Welter highlights the inaugural event's opening general session at 6:45 p.m. on May 1. A female trailblazer in her own right, Welter was the first female to coach in the NFL, having worked with Arizona Cardinals linebackers in 2015. She previously coached the Texas Revolution of Champions Indoor Football (CIF). It was with the Revolution that Welter also competed as the first female running back in a men's professional league in 2014. The coaching roles proved to be a springboard to other opportunities. Welter most recently served as a defensive specialist for the Atlanta Legends of the Alliance of American Football (AAF). As a player, Welter had a highly decorated career in women's professional football, including four world championships and eight all-star selections. She also won gold medals earlier in her career as a member of Team USA in the 2010 and 2013 International Federation of American Football's (IFAF) Women's World Championship.

"Reimagining Through Innovation" lays the foundation for day two, which begins with **Butterick** hosting the second general session at 2 p.m. on Monday, May 2. A former coach with college- and WNBA-coaching experience, Butterick uses her unique background to help improve communication for individuals from the locker room to the boardroom. She meets coaches where they are and supports the growth that they're looking to make. Through her work as a communication specialist, Butterick also helps teams improve communication effectiveness while working collaboratively to create positive change at all levels of the team.

The third and final day of the virtual summit, coined the "Realizing Your Power" session, kicks off at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, May 2. Following the second day of moderated panel discussion at 3 p.m., the virtual summit draws to a close as retired basketball official **Violet Palmer** bookends the event as its closing general session speaker at 4 p.m.

Boasting experience in the NBA, WNBA and NCAA, Palmer made history in 1997 when she officiated an NBA game, making her the first woman to do so for a men's professional sporting event. That same year, she also officiated the inaugural WNBA Championship. Palmer added to her legacy nearly a decade later when she became the first woman to oversee a NBA postseason game, and, in

2014, became the first woman to officiate an all-star game of any major sport in the United States. A native of Lynwood, California, she was a star point guard at nearby Compton (California) High School. Palmer helped later lead Cal Poly Pomona University to back-to-back NCAA Division II national championships (1985, 1986).

Breakout sessions led by esteemed coaches, administrators and officials follow introductory remarks on each day of the virtual summit. They feature discussion from experts with experience working alongside the Little League World Series, USA Track and Field, NCAA, Atlantic Coast Conference, Pac-12, and state high school athletic/activity associations.

Relaxed Hair Adornment, Uniform Rules Among Administrative Changes Set for High School Volleyball in 2022-23

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (February 28, 2022) — Hair adornments such as beads are now legal in high school volleyball as long as they are securely fastened and do not endanger other players. This rule change, along with eliminating manufacturer reference size and quantity restrictions on uniform bottom waistbands, headline new rules adopted for the 2022-23 season.

In all, seven rules changes were recommended by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Volleyball Rules Committee at its annual meeting January 16-18. All rules changes were reviewed and approved by the NFHS Board of Directors.

"Most of this year's rules changes deal with the administrative side of things. The NFHS Volleyball Rules Committee really feels like the sport is in a great place," said Jo Auch, assistant executive director of the South Dakota High School Activities Association and chair of the NFHS Volleyball Rules Committee. "The two changes of note relax restrictions on hair adornments such as beads, as well as the number of manufacturer logos on uniform bottoms. We've seen

some different trends in these areas that helped lead to the changes we made. We feel pretty positive about them and believe coaches, officials and players will, too."

To align officials' rulings on flat barrettes and other hair adornments, the Volleyball Rules Committee eliminated size restrictions of 2 inches or less that were previously cited in Rule 4-1-6. The rule now allows for bobby pins, flat clips, flat barrettes and other adornments to legally be worn in the hair as long they do not present a safety hazard to the player, teammates or opponents.

The adoption of changes to Rule 4-2-1f presents student-athletes with the opportunity to wear uniform bottoms featuring multiple manufacturer logos, trademarks or references that exceed 2¼ inches on waistbands. Oftentimes, student-athletes are responsible for supplying their own uniform bottom. Given current trends in the sport of volleyball, the rules committee recognized the lack of uniform bottoms available to student-athletes without substantial manufacturer representation.

"The Volleyball Rules Committee took another step in creating a more inclusive environment within the sport by relaxing restrictions on hair adornments," said Lindsey Atkinson, NFHS director of sports and liaison to the Volleyball Rules Committee. "It was extremely important to the rules committee to create rules language that supported diversity of hair trends while minimizing the risk of injury to the athlete, teammates and opponents."

Another focal point of the committee was the alignment of Rule 5-6-3b, e, and Rule 5-7-3e, addressing scorer and libero notification procedures. The committee's actions eliminate the use of the sounding device when an improper server is used and aligns the notification to that of a discrepancy in the score, at which point the second referee is notified during the first dead ball.

Other changes adopted by the Volleyball Rules Committee include additional allowances for time-out and substitution-related requests by a head coach, assistant coach or playing captain.

Changes to Rule 11-2-1 now allow for verbalized requests for a time-out on a dead ball by the head coach or playing captain prior to the first referee's signal for the ensuing serve. This

allows the second referee to grant a time-out during a dead ball without visual signal when heard verbalized by a head coach or captain and not require the visual signal.

The introduction of new language to Rule 12-2-5a clarifies that assistant coaches may ask the second referee for the number of their team's substitutions during a dead-ball situation. Previously, the rule allowed for assistant coaches to review the accuracy of the score, verify the number of time-outs, request the serving order of the assistant coach's team, and verify the proper server for the opponent.

According to the most recent NFHS High School Athletics Participation Survey, volleyball is the second-most popular sports for girls (trailing track and field) with 452,808 participants in 16,572 schools nationwide. In addition, there are 63,563 boys participating in the sport at 2,692 schools, and 25 states conduct state championships in boys volleyball.

NFHS Foundation Approves Grant to Distribute Wet Bulb Globe Thermometers to High Schools

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (February 3, 2022)— The NFHS Foundation has announced a grant program to distribute 5,000 wet bulb globe thermometers to high schools across the country. The \$1.5 million program will provide schools with an important tool for minimizing heat-related illness during outdoor activities.

Wet bulb globe thermometers measure the heat stress in direct sunlight, accounting for temperature, humidity, wind speed, sun angle and cloud cover. High schools can use the thermometer's reading to help determine if the weather is appropriate to hold outdoor activities.

"The mission of the NFHS Foundation is, in part, to fund research and programs for risk minimization, and this program certainly satisfies that," NFHS Chief Operating Officer Davis Whitfield said. "This program is a direct distribution to schools to help ensure the health and safety of students."

An initial grant was approved by the NFHS Foundation Board of Directors last fall of \$450,000, but demand for the thermometers was so high that an additional

distribution was approved in January to cover the purchase of 5,000 units.

Approximately 2,500 thermometers will be distributed in April, with the remainder to be delivered to schools in time for late-summer workouts. The NFHS will work with its

member state associations to distribute the thermometers to schools.

"The NFHS Foundation Board of Directors unanimously supported these additional funds. We all felt it will more immediately assist our member schools to proactively reduce risk for our students," said Billy Strickland, NFHS Foundation Board of Directors president and executive director of the Alaska School Activities Association.

Each Kestrel-made thermometer will be calibrated by geographic zone and come with a tripod and Bluetooth capability for school administrators to access the information via phone. The NFHS will also produce and provide a tutorial video — through the NFHS Learning Center — on how to operate the thermometers.

NFHS Learning Center Delivers 15 Millionth Course

In addition to students, the Learning Center has served — and continues to serve — nearly two million coaches, hundreds of thousands of parents and tens of thousands of administrators and officials.

"Years ago, we were excited and humbled by impacting tens of thousands through the NFHS Learning Center," Schuster said. "Now, we have had the opportunity to impact millions of people in the midst of participating in or facilitating interscholastic activities."

In 2010, *Concussion in Sports* was the first course to be made available at no cost. To date, the course has been accessed more than six million times, making up more than 40 percent of the Learning Center's deliveries.

During the early portion of the COVID-19 pandemic, the NFHS Learning Center adapted to quickly turn around and provide a COVID-19 course for coaches and administrators, which has been accessed more than 300,000 times.

On as-needed basis, select state associations use the platform to host modified courses with state components tailored to states' needs such as complying with state statutes or by working with the NFHS to put together preseason rules clinic courses for coaches, administrators and officials.

NFHS Learning Center Debuts Free "Football Tackling" Course Through NFL Partnership

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (March 1, 2022) —The National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) and the National Football League (NFL) have teamed up to produce a new, free "Football Tackling" course for the NFHS Learning Center, designed to assist interscholastic coaches in teaching, evaluating and programming proper tackling techniques.

"This course is full of valuable tools and actual drills that will help any interscholastic football coach, and it is a welcome addition to the NFHS Learning Center," said Dan Schuster, NFHS Director of Educational Services. "Not only is the content valuable, but it is available at no cost, which will allow easy access to football coaches across the country."

"We're excited to work together with NFHS to provide this free course to high school coaches and continue our efforts of growing the game of football and advocating for player protection," said Roman Oben, NFL Vice President of Football Development. "We believe this course will enable athletes to continue playing football at a high level while implementing proper playing techniques."

"Football Tackling" begins by presenting that coaches must have a simple framework to effectively teach tackling while also managing contact. Coaching "checkpoints" known as Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are also addressed in the opening chapter and range from striking accuracy and body positioning to appropriate drill intensity.

The course also stresses the importance of managing contact while players become acclimated to tackling drills and other physical practice activities. Balancing a regimen of contact and non-contact training is not only an effective way to monitor contact frequency and severity, it also provides opportunities for players to hone tackling mechanics such as tracking and leverage before putting them to use at full speed.

Another section takes an in-depth look at different types of tackling drills and separates them into four distinct categories: teaching drills, tracking drills, bag drills and 'Small Space, Big Fight' drills. Each subgroup contains roughly five drill examples that are profiled in detail according to their skill development objectives and can be used at various speeds and levels of contact for targeted instruction.

The final chapter of "Football Tackling" touches on equipment fitting and presents the necessary guide information and measurements for assuring players are wearing appropriately sized helmets and shoulder pads.

The "Football Tackling" course is one of several projects resulting from the NFHS-NFL partnership that was announced in September 2020. This first-ever partnership was aimed at promoting the growth, understanding and support for football at the high school level. A major focus of the NFHS-NFL partnership has been surveying of state

high school association administrators, high school student-athletes, parents, coaches and officials with regard to their experiences in football and the benefits of participation.

In addition, the partnership was started to identify, inform and educate participants, partners, associations, government and media around the benefits and values of participating in high school football.

Ed Passino, the senior consultant for high school football promotion who was hired to lead the NFHS-NFL partnership, has been involved in the production of "Football Tackling" as a part of his position to work with external stakeholders and football organizations to promote, grow and improve the overall perception of football at the high school level.

"Coaching education and player protection are primary pillars of the NFHS-NFL partnership, and this tackle course exemplifies that commitment," said Ed Passino, Senior Consultant for High School Football. "Built alongside football coaches and athletic administrators across the country, this course provides coaches a lens to not only teach and evaluate tackling, but it also delivers concepts to best develop confidence in players through appropriate contact load management, skill instruction and progression guidelines."
