There are two (2) candidates on the ballot vying for the seat of State CIF President-Elect: Monica Colunga - Southern Section and Marco Sanchez - Central Coast Section. (Pages 19-21)
- 3. State CIF Executive Committee Nominations 2018-19**
It has been the practice of the SJS BOM to give the Federated Council Representatives the authority to use their discretion when voting. There are seven (7) candidates on the ballot vying for five (5) seats: Sara Wetteland has been nominated for the Executive Committee. (Pages 22-24)
- 4. State CIF Budget for 2018-19**
The proposed budget recommends changes in income and expense in several categories based upon past years experience, changes in marketing due to a new statewide partnership, and a proposed 2% salary adjustment for staff (COLA). Both income and expenses are expected to increase by 11% and the budget indicates an end of the year surplus. (Pages 25-39)

B. OLD BUSINESS (Action "Voting" Items)

These are action items presented for approval by the SJS Board of Managers.

1. Sac-Joaquin Section Items

a. Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 2007.8 - Football Playoffs

This is a consolidated football playoff proposal, as per the request of the Board, at the January 31, 2018 meeting (it combines "New Business" items (from the 1/31/18 BOM meeting) b., d., t., and eliminates c. This proposal changes the following: size of brackets in Divisions I-VI from sixteen (16) & eight (8) to twelve (12); eliminates the additional playoff berths to the Delta & Sierra Foothill Leagues; eliminates the top 8s; changes automatic qualifiers from two (2) per league to one (1) per league (Co-League Champions = automatic qualifier); and changes at-large qualifiers from total number of wins to berths based on CalPreps rankings, effective fall 2018. (Pages 40-43)

b. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2006.1 - Football Playoffs (Tie-Breaker)

Based on the fact that the State CIF has gone to using the 25-yard line tie-breaker system for regional and state football championships, the Football Advisory Committee and Section staff are proposing to change the currently used 10-yard tie-breaking system to the 25-yard tie-breaking system. This would allow our member schools the opportunity to experience the 25-yard system, should there be a need, prior to regional or state play. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Pages 44)

c. Proposed Revisions to Bylaws 1502.7.c.4, 1606.1.a.1, 2007.8.e.4, 2500.5.b.4, 2601.7.b.4, 2805.5.a.2.iv, 3002.1.a.4 and 3107.7.c.2 - League Champions (Automatic Qualifiers)

Section staff is proposing language that would make it possible for any/ all league champions to advance to playoffs no matter how many automatic qualifiers the league may have. There have been occurrences where a co-champion or tri-champion was not able to advance to post season play. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 45)

d. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2100.1 - Golf Divisional (Venue Restrictions)

There currently exists an equity issue in the sport of golf, when our Section divisional tournaments are hosted at a private course - the host school has access while others do not. As a result Section staff is proposing language that would require any site hosting a divisional golf championship must allow practice rounds to all requesting schools. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 46)

e. Proposed Bylaws 2100.3.g.1.xii & 2100.4.g.1.xii - Golf (At-Large Berths)

On the very rare occasion that a league would have an exceptional level of depth on a given year, creating a situation in which they have deserving teams that would not qualify through the automatic qualifying berths, Section staff is proposing language that would create an at-large score for a golf team, that does not qualify as an automatic qualifier, to advance to the divisional tournament. This proposal has been altered from its original version based on feedback/request of the BOM at the January 31, 2018 BOM meeting - the at-large qualifying score has been adjusted per division. Requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 47)

f. Proposed Dead Period Adjustment for the sport of Water Polo

The Playoff Committee and Section staff are proposing adjustments to the water polo "Dead Period". There currently exists a conflict between the current section dead period (July 9) and qualifying for junior nationals, which sees many of our schools and programs in potential violation. As a result it is being recommended to postpone the water polo dead period by two weeks - moving it from starting July 9 to starting July 23. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Pages 48-49)

g. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1606.1.a - Basketball Playoffs (Additional Berth-TCAL)

As discussed in realignment, Section staff is proposing that the Tri-City Athletic League (TCAL) be granted an additional playoff berth in boys & girls basketball playoffs. This is based on the placement of Modesto Christian in what is already a difficult basketball league. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 50)

h. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1606.1.a.1 - Basketball Playoffs (At-Large Berths)

The Playoff Committee is proposing language adjustments to at-large qualifiers in the sport of basketball - Boys & Girls. Currently at-large berths are based on the Top 12 for divisions I-IV & Top 8 for divisions V-VI. The proposed adjustment is to go to the Top 15 for divisions I-IV and Top 10 for divisions V-VI. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 51)

i. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1800.2 - Cross County Divisional Placement

The Playoff Committee and Cross Country Advisory Committee are proposing language that would prevent a Section champion, from the previous year, to move down to a lower division the following year. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 52)

j. Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 2900.7 - Track and Field: Playoffs: Divisional

Due to realignment, the current playoff system becomes imbalanced. In an attempt to make things more equitable, divisions have been realigned altering some leagues' divisional placement. Additionally, the proposal recommends going from three (3) meets to four (4) meets. (Pages 53-55)

k. Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 3203.7.b - Wrestling: Playoffs - Divisional

This proposal is a result of the reduction of Division I leagues, due to realignment. In an attempt to make the divisions as equitable and competitive as possible, so as to advance the best of the SJS wrestlers to the Masters Tournament, leagues' divisions have been adjusted. Additionally, with fewer Division I leagues the format changes from six (6) divisions to five (5) divisions. (Page 56-57)

1. Proposed Optional Season of Sport - Soccer

Section staff, as explained at the October 4, 2017, Board of Managers meeting, is bringing forward a proposal that would allow member schools that desire to play boys soccer in the fall and girls soccer in the spring (as opposed to the winter) the opportunity to do so. Schools choosing to play in the fall & spring, as an alternative, would do so for a four-year period of time. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Pages 58-60)

m. Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 503.5 and 503.6 - Classifications (Juniors on JV)

The Central California Conference (CCC) and Sierra Foothill League (SFL) are proposing the classifications of varsity and junior varsity within the Sac-Joaquin Section and allowing juniors (11th grade) the opportunity to participate at the junior varsity level. This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Page 61)

n. Proposed Revisions to bylaws 505 and 1200 (Article 12) - Number of Contacts

This proposal aligns the allowable numbers of contacts within the Sac-Joaquin Section with the recently State CIF adopted allowable number of contacts . This includes all sports within the Sac-Joaquin Section, not just those sports culminating in a regional and/ or state championship. Additionally, this proposal removes, "number of contacts" information from Bylaw 505 and places it in Bylaw 1200 (Article 12). This is being requested to go into effect - Fall 2018. (Pages 62-66)

o. Election of Small, Medium & Large School Athletic Director Representatives - No Backup

As per Article 3, Section 3.2.a, athletic director representatives shall be elected to two-year terms and shall be elected at the spring meeting of the Board of Managers. 2. **State CIF Items**

a. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 208.A.(4) - Foreign Exchange Programs Host Family**

The CIF Southern Section Council approved and has forwarded a proposed revision to modify the participation of a student who is in an approved Foreign Exchange Program. Current policy prohibits athletic eligibility when the student is hosted by a coach, paid or volunteer. This revision would allow "limited" participation at the non-varsity level if they are hosted by a coach, paid or volunteer. (Pages 95-96)

b. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 504.M - Day of Respite**

The CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Board of Managers approved and has forwarded a proposed revision to modify the Day of Respite for schools founded upon religious tenets that observe the Sabbath from Friday sundown until Saturday sundown. (Pages 97-99)

c. **Proposed Bylaw 502 - Competition vs. Non-CIF Member Schools**

The Commissioners' Committee is proposing a revision to further clarify who a CIF Member School is allowed to play. Schools outside of California must be members in good standing with their respective State Association and must also be eligible to compete in that State Association's Championship Playoffs. (Pages 100-101)

d. **Proposed Bylaw 2001.B Revisions - Football Full Contact Allowance**

The Football Advisory Committee and the Commissioners Committee are proposing revisions to Bylaw 2001.B, Full Contact Allowance. (Pages 102-104)

e. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 201.A.(4)**

The Commissioners' Committee is proposing a revision to Bylaw 201.A.(4), that would allow schools to meet with incoming 8th grade students and parents after May 1 only if the student has registered for classes at the CIF member school or in the case of a private school, paid a non-refundable registration fee. If approved, this bylaw revision is for immediate implementation. (Pages 105-106)

f. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 207.B.(5).c.(viii)(e) - Return to Previous School**

The Commissioners' Committee is proposing a revision to Bylaw 207.B.(5).c.(viii)(e), Return to Previous School Hardship. Presently "Return to Previous School" is listed under "Hardship Waivers". This proposal would move this exception to a more appropriate place in Bylaw 207.B.3-Transfer Eligibility. (Pages 107-108)

b. SJS Economic Viability Committee.

John Becker reported the SJS Economic Viability Committee met and reviewed fall playoffs; the year to date budget; the Wachovia fund; and the first reading of the 2018-19 proposed budget. Alan Peterson explained this revision would restructure the SJS swimming and diving championships from one division to three divisions. This would be effective spring 2018.

Alan Peterson explained that the Editorial and Commissioners Committee are proposing eliminating Bylaw 1605 because the rule is enforced by Bylaw 1201 and the NFHS Basketball Rule Book. This would be effective starting 2018-19.

Motion to approve proposed elimination of Bylaw 1605, Basketball Coaching Box.

C. NEW BUSINESS (Non-voting Items)

These are first-reading items presented for the purposes of information. No action is anticipated, however a member can revise the agenda in order to act on any of Section-related items. State items will be first reads at the Federated Council meeting on October 6, 2017.

1. Sac-Joaquin Section Items

a. Proposed CIFSJS Bylaw 1800.2 - Cross Country Divisional Placement

Will DeBoard explained this proposed revision would add language to the section bylaws that would not allow a Section champion from the previous year to move down to a lower division the following year. This would be effective fall 2018.

b. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2007.8.g.7 - Football Playoffs (Bracket Size)

Ryan Tos explained this proposed revision would change the size of brackets for football in Division I-VI from sixteen (16) and eight (8) to twelve (12). This would be effective fall 2018.

c. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2007.8.e.2 - Football Playoffs (Additional Berth SFL)

Ryan Tos explained this proposal came out of the realignment committee and would grant the Sierra Foothill League an additional playoff berth for football playoffs, effective fall 2018.

d. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2007.8.e.1 - Football Playoffs (Automatic Qualifiers)

Ryan Tos explained this proposed revision would reduce the number of automatic qualifiers for football from two to one per league, effective fall 2018.

t. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2007.8.e.1 - Football Playoffs (Automatic Qualifiers)

Ryan Tos explained this proposed revision changes the process for at-large qualifiers for football playoffs. Current process is based on total number of wins. The proposal awards at-large bids based on calpreps rankings. The purpose of this is staffs concerns with 1) first round games specifically for our top four seeds are not competitive; 2) some schools that do advance to regional and state championship game are playing 16 games.

Note: The above items and item K will come back in April as one proposal with the elimination of Item C.

- e. **Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2006.1 - Football Playoffs (Tie-Breaker)**
Ryan Tos explained this proposed revision changes the currently used 10-yard tie-breaking system with the 25-yard tie-breaking system, effective fall 2018.
- f. **Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2100.1 -Golf Divisional (Venue Restrictions)**
Ryan Tos explained this proposed revision would require that any site hosting a divisional golf championship must allow practice rounds to all requesting schools, effective fall 2018.
- g. **Proposed Bylaws 2100.3.g.1.xii & 2100.4.g.1.xii-Golf (At-Large Berths)**
Ryan Tos explained this proposed revision, which would allow an "at-large" score at a league tournament to advance that team to the divisional round. Board directed staff to adjust language to include an 18 hole-culminating tournament and a minimum course rating or slope rating. This will be effective fall 2018.
- h. **Proposed Dead Period Adjustment for the sport of Water Polo**
Ryan Tos reviewed this proposal, which adjusts the water polo dead period, postponing the dead period by two weeks - moving it from starting July 9 to starting July 23, effective fall 2018. This proposal is being brought forward due to a conflict between the current water polo dead period and junior nationals. If we do not adjust the dead period we could lose many high school coaches who will choose club over high school.
- i. **Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1606.1.a - Basketball Playoffs (Additional Berth-TCAL)**
Ryan Tos explained that this proposed revision would grant the TCAL an additional playoff berth in boys and girls basketball.
- j. **Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1606.1.a.1 - Basketball Playoffs (At-Large Berths)**
Ryan Tos explained that this proposed revision would change the language in the bylaw to include the Top 15 / Top 10 in the MaxPreps rankings instead of the Top 12 / Top 8).
- k. **Proposed Revisions to Bylaws 1502.7.c.4, 1606.1.a.1, 2007.8.e.4, 2500.5.b.4, 2601.7.b.4, 2805.5.a.2.iv, 3002.1.a.4 and 3107.7.c.2- League Champions (Automatic Qualifiers)**
Ryan Tos explained the revisions to these bylaws would allow any league champion to advance to playoffs for all sports no matter how many automatic berths the league may have.
- l. **Proposed Optional Season of Sport - Soccer**
Commissioner Garrison reviewed this proposed option, which would allow schools in our section to play boys soccer in the fall, and girls soccer in the spring. Any school choosing to do so, will do this for a four (4) year period and must notify the section office by May 1, 2018.
- m. **Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 503.5 and 503.6- Classifications (Juniors on JV)**
Commissioner Garrison reviewed this proposed revision brought forth by the CCC and SFL, which would allow juniors to participate at the Junior Varsity level in all sports. Commissioner Garrison commented that the SJS is one of two sections that have a rule about juniors.
- n. **Proposed Revisions to Bylaws 505 and 1200 (Article 12)- Number of Contacts**
Commissioner Garrison reviewed this proposed revision to increase our section schools number of allowable contacts to align with recently state adopted allowable number of contacts. This would place our member schools on a level playing field with other sections across the state.
- o. **Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 2900.7-Track and Field: Playoff-Divisionals**
Will DeBoard reviewed this proposed revision which would adjust the divisions for the track and field playoff system. As a result, we would have three meets instead of four.
- p. **Proposed Revisions to Bylaw 3203.7.b-Wrestling:Playoffs-Divisionals**
Will DeBoard reviewed this proposed revision which would adjust the divisions for the SJS Divisional Tournaments to make the split more fair and equitable. There will be five divisions in individual wrestling instead of six.
- q. **Election of Small, Medium, & Large School Athletic Director Representatives**
Commissioner Garrison reviewed the upcoming elections (April 2018) of the small, medium and large school athletic director representatives for the board of managers. Applications are due Monday, February 5, 2018.
- r. **Sac-Joaquin Section President & President-Elect Nominations**

Peter Efstathiou went over the SJS President & President-Elect nominees for the board of directors for 2018-19 and 2019-20.

President nominees: John Becker, Principal - Antelope High School.

President Elect nominees: Kevin Swartwood, Principal - Golden Valley High School

Michael Moore, Principal - Oakdale High School

Nominations were also taken from the floor.

s. **Proposed Budget for 2018-2019**

John Becker reviewed the proposed budget for 2018-2019 school year. The budget comes in balanced with a \$20K cushion. Mr. Becker shared with the Board that the Economic Viability Committee reviewed the proposed budget and supports it.

2. **State CIF Items**

a. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 208.A.(4) - Foreign Exchange Programs Host Family**

Commissioner Garrison explained that this proposed bylaw revision submitted from the Southern Section would grant "limited" non-varsity athletic eligibility to a student who resides/hosted by a member of the school's coaching staff, paid or volunteer. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018.

b. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 504.M - Day of Respite**

Sarah Wetteland explained the proposed revision submitted from the Sac-Joaquin Section that clarifies the alternate day of rest as a 24-hour period running from sundown Friday - sundown Saturday. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018.

c. **Proposed Bylaw 502 - Competition vs. Non-CIF Member Schools**

Commissioner Garrison explained that this proposal would help to ensure that CIF member schools shall only compete with other member schools of the CIF and/or schools who are members of another state association/federation. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018, and if passed, be implemented in 2019-2020.

d. **Proposed Bylaw 2001.B Revisions - Football Full Contact Allowance**

Commissioner Garrison reviewed that this proposal would allow the CIF to have a more restrictive limitation on full contact practice, limiting full contact to no more than 45 minutes per day for a total of 90 minutes per week. The current Bylaw limits full contact to no more than 90 minutes per day for a total of 180 minutes per week. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018.

e. **Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 - Continuation School**

Commissioner Garrison reviewed that this proposed revision would grant the ability of a continuation school to multi-campus with a member school. As a result a student at such a school could gain eligibility as long as the student's attendance at the Continuation school (Continued Ed Center) is not a result of discipline. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018.

f. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 207.B.(5).c.(viii)(e)**

Commissioner Garrison reviewed that this proposed revision is to remove "return to previous school" as a hardship and place it elsewhere as it will result in a transfer. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018.

g. **Proposed Bylaw Revision 201.A.(4)**

Commissioner Garrison reviewed that this proposed revision would allow schools to meet with incoming 8th grade students and parents after May 1 if the student has registered for classes at the CIF member school, or in a private school paid a non-refundable tuition. This will be an action item at the Federated Council meeting on April 6, 2018 and will go into effect May 2018 if passed.

- No outside competition of any kind is permitted during the Limited Period.
- All football activities must meet the provisions of CIF Sac-Joaquin Section bylaws 2003.1, 2003.2 and 2003.3.

Out of Season

- Out of Season activities must be sponsored by an agency not under the authority of the CIF as specified in Bylaw 504.7 and 504.9. If this option is chosen, the use of school equipment is not permitted, any facility usage must be approved by school district administration, and the group must provide proof of insurance.
- All football activities must meet the provisions of Sac-Joaquin Section bylaws 2003.1, 2003.2 and 2003.3.

Summer

- Summer (See Bylaws 501F and G and 504.7b and c and 504.9j): The Sac-Joaquin Section will be dark from June 1 (with the exception of Bylaw 2003.2) until the first day of fall practice. Therefore, all athletic activities during this time period shall be under the authority of each league and/or school district.
- All football activities must meet the provisions of Sac-Joaquin Section bylaws 2003.1, 2003.2 and 2003.3.

Last Contest Date

- The Last Contest Date is the last day permissible for any regular season competition, practice or activity in that sport as determined in the Sport Calendar.

End of Season Dead Period

- The end of season dead period begins immediately following the last contest date for each respective sport. Coaches and their athletes are not allowed to participate in club activities together during this time. The same rules as the preseason dead period apply. (Bylaw 504.Sb)

B. Executive Director

1. NFHS Report

Executive Director Roger Blake stated that the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) has honored 29 California coaches as California Coaches of the Year. He stated that at each seat was a listing of high school coaches and their high schools who were honored. Framed certificates were given to each section to honor each Coach of the Year. As part of the NFHS Section 7, the NFHS honored Eric McCahon, boys' soccer coach, Cordova High School in the Sac-Joaquin Section, as the NFHS Section 7 Coach of the Year recipient.

Mr. Blake reported that he attended the NFHS Executive Director's Winter meeting in January in Scottsdale, Arizona. Howard Tullman, CEO of 1871, spoke at the meeting. Mr. Tullman, a futurist out of Chicago, Illinois, spoke about looking into the future for education-based athletics. He stated that organizations need to evolve into the future or face extinction.

B. Informational - Proposed Non-Action Items

1. Proposed Budget for 2018-2019

President-Elect James Perry presented the Proposed Budget for 2018-2019. He reviewed and explained each line item. He stated that the Executive Committee and the Economic Viability Committee voted unanimously to accept the Proposed Budget for 2018-2019.

2. CIF Executive Committee Nominations

President Amy McNamara reported that the Nominating Committee met via conference call in the fall and nominated two candidates for President-Elect and candidates for the Executive Committee. She announced that one of the two nominees for President-Elect announced their retirement and therefore is not eligible to run for office. President Amy McNamara opened the floor for nominations for the Executive Committee. There were no nominations from the floor. The Federated Council will cast their votes on April 6, 2018 for the office of President-Elect and the Executive Committee for 2018-2019.

3. Proposed Bylaw Revision 208.A.(4)- Foreign Exchange Programs Host Family

Executive Committee member Monica Colunga reported this proposal is coming from the Southern Section. This proposal will allow the CIF to grant unlimited non-varsity athletic eligibility to a student who resides or is hosted by a member who is a school coach, paid or volunteer. She stated that identify that this proposed bylaw revision is specific to foreign exchange students and not international students. Foreign exchange students enter the United States carrying a J-1 Visa.

4. Proposed Bylaw Revision 504.M - Day of Respite

Executive Committee member Sara Wetteland reported that this proposal is coming from the Sac-Joaquin Section. The proposed bylaw revision relates to schools who are founded on a religious tenet who observe a day of respite from Friday sundown to Saturday sundown. The change of the bylaw will allow these schools to pick an alternate day of respite to allow them to participate in athletic events. Schools would self-monitor themselves.

5. Proposed Bylaw Revision 502- Competition vs. Non-CIF Member Schools

Associate Executive Director Ron Nocetti reported out. He stated that this Commissioner's Committee is proposing a revision to Bylaw 502 to further clarify who a CIF Member School is allowed to play. CIF Member Schools can also play schools from other state associations who are also eligible to participate in their own state association's playoffs. A Q&A page will be developed to answer further questions.

6. Proposed Bylaw 2001.B Revisions - Football Full Contact Allowance

Executive Committee member Marty Bitter reported that the Football Advisory Committee and the Commissioner's Committee is proposing the revisions to Bylaw 2001.B. to two days per week of 45 minutes of full contact. Full contact would consist of thud and game-like. Schools can still be in full pads on the non-contact days and engage in control contact as per the bylaw.

7. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 - Continuation School

Associate Executive Director Ron Nocetti stated because of questions from various section meetings, we are going to suggest pulling this proposed bylaw revision for further investigation by the commissioners in March. The proposed bylaw revision will be brought back to the Federated Council at the April meeting as a first reading item.

8. Proposed Bylaws Revision 201.A.4.

Associate Executive Director Ron Nocetti reported out. He stated that the commissioners suggested changing the words "athletic meetings" to "athletic communications." The intent is not to have actual face to face meetings, but to allow schools to be able to send communications directly from coaches to students who have expressed interest in playing fall sports.

9. Proposed Bylaw MoYe: Return to Previous School

Associate Executive Director Ron Nocetti reported that this bylaw is not changing and is just being moved to another section of the Constitution & Bylaws. Currently, Return to Previous School is listed under Hardships.

Proposed Budget Summary 2018-2019

This proposed budget for your consideration recommends changes in income and expenses in several categories based upon past years experiences, changes in marketing due to a new statewide partnership, and a proposed 2% salary adjustment for staff. The budget indicates an end of the year surplus and the recommended changes are detailed in the "budget notes" that precede the itemized budget pages.

There are several changes in the Championship Events category which include increased expenses in golf, wrestling and basketball based on prior years numbers. Golf expenses are increasing due to shared costs moving forward with the NCGA and SCGA.

Income Overview

Income projections are based using a conservative approach forecasting an increase (11%) in major revenue streams to the organization. from \$5.43 million to \$6.14 million. Keeping consistent with past practice, the projected figures are based on conservative income numbers. Our overall income has increased primarily due to the new statewide marketing partnership, in addition to coaching education and broadcast rights.

The major sources of income for the CIF are 1) championship events (37%), 2) marketing and corporate support (34%) and 3) legal assessment to schools (16%).

Expenses Overview

Expenses to the organization are projected to increase in conjunction with income due to the marketing partnership (11%) based on the figures in the proposed budget, from \$5.38 million to \$6.06 million. Our overall expenses have increased primarily due to the new statewide marketing partnership, however, the majority of this is distributed to the Sections based on their marketing split.

The major expenses of the organization are 1) championship events (27%) with the vast majority of those funds being returned to schools to reimburse local expenses, 2) marketing (21%) with most of these funds given directly to CIF Sections for their distribution share in state-wide marketing income, 3) salary and benefits for employees and retirees (21%), and 4) legal, liability and insurance costs (19%).

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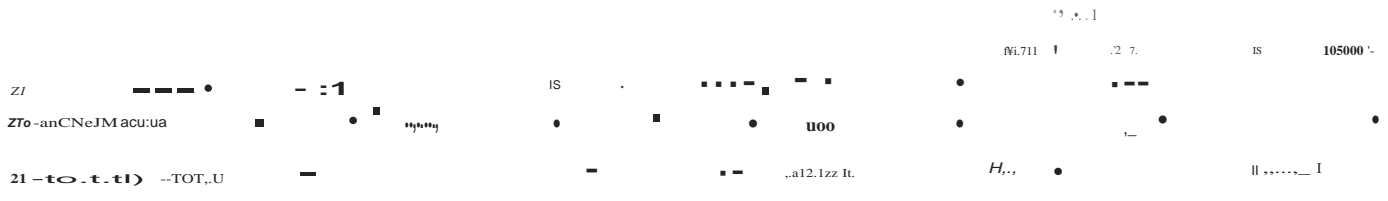

Proposal Summary:

This proposal would change:

- / Automatic qualifiers for the sport of football from two (2) to one (1) per league (all co-champions would be included in the playoff field).
- / The size of brackets for the sport of football in Divisions I-VI from sixteen (16) & eight (8) team brackets to twelve (12) team brackets.
- / The process for at-large qualifiers for football playoffs. Current process is based on total # of wins. This proposal recommends awarding at-large bids based on calpreps rankings.
- / Eliminates "Top 8" for the sport of football.
- / Eliminates any and all additional football playoff berths for the Delta League and Sierra Foothill League

Fiscal Impact:

Unknown - with the movement to twelve (12) team brackets it could be positive or negative even though there will be the same total number of playoff contests.

Rationale:

- / Staff feels that having more at-large berths will create a deeper and more competitive playoff field.

- / The change to using calpreps rankings for at-large bids eliminates the need of the "Top 8" or additional berths to the Delta League or Sierra Foothill League
- / Staff feels that this change would increase the overall quality of the field of playoff teams.
- / Another benefit might be that some schools could have an easier time of scheduling their non-league contests.
- / This change addresses the following concerns regarding our football playoffs:
 1. Opening round games involving the top 4 seeds are rarely competitive.
 - a. For Divisions I-III the average margin of victory for the top 4 seeds in 2017 was 39 points.
 2. The teams advancing to the regional tournament are often one of our top 4 seeds and this would eliminate a game for those teams.
 - a. In the past three years, the only team from Division I-III to advance to the regional games was Del Oro in 2015, as a #5 seed.
 - b. In the past three years, for all Divisions, 18 of the 21 regional qualifiers have been Top 4 seeds in their respective divisions.
 3. The elimination of one game for our regional qualifiers would make them similar to other Sections' regional qualifiers in total number of games.

Proposed Bylaw:

2007.8 PLAYOFFS

- a. Sac-Joaquin Section competition will consist of seven divisions in football: Divisions I, II, III, IV, V, VI and VII.
- e. Divisions I, II, III, IV, V, VI and VII will be comprised of the CAL, CCA.A, CCC, CVC, Delta, GBL, MEL, Metro, MLL, MMC, PVL, SCAC, SDL, SFL, SJFV, SAL, S.MAL, SVC, TCAL, TCC, TVL, VOL and W.AC.
- b. Playoff formats will be published for the football playoffs for each division. See Calendar of Events for tentative dates.
- c. Tie-breaker system will be the one outlined in Bylaw 2006.1 above.

d. Qualifying -- Divisions I-VII

1. Each league will qualify no teams one team in the playoffs. If a league has multiple league champions they will all qualify for the playoffs. However, if a league has less than six teams participating, that league will qualify two teams.
2. The Delta League and the Sierra Foothill League will qualify three teams an additional team.
3. In addition, the eight leagues that have had the best playoff winning percentage over the past three seasons will receive an additional spot in the playoffs.

2. At-Large Qualifiers

For the purposes of at-large qualifying, all schools will be divided into seven divisions as follows: The largest 90% of all schools that play football will be divided into six divisions. Division VII will be composed of the smallest 10% of schools that play football. If there is an odd number of teams, the first additional school will fill in at Division I, then Division II and finally Division III.

1. In columns I-VI, 12 schools from each column will be selected for playoff competition.
 - a. All automatic qualifiers will be selected first.
 - b. The remaining qualifiers will be selected based on their calpreps.com ranking. *(Each division may vary- for example Division I may have 10 automatic qualifiers and 2 at-large qualifiers while D II may have 6 automatic qualifiers and 6 at-large qual(fiers, etc.)*
- ii. In column VII six schools will be selected for playoff competition.
 - a. All automatic qualifiers will be selected first.
 - b. The remaining qualifiers will be selected based on their calpreps.com ranking.
- iii. If necessary the school(s) that are not league champions and have the smallest enrollments in any column may be moved down to a lower divisions to have an even number of teams in each division.
- iv. At-large selections must win a minimum of four games during the regular season.

e :f Breaking League Ties

See Bylaw 2007.11 below.

f g. Divisional Placement

1. **Divisions.** The qualifying teams will be placed in divisions in order of enrollment size. However, schools may not play more than one division below their league placement in realignment. If a school's enrollment places them in a division that is two or more divisions below its league placement in realignment, that school will be moved up at least one division for playoffs.
2. **Section Champion From Previous Year.** If a school wins a Section championship at a particular level, that school must play at or above that level the following year.
3. **League Champions.** If a team wins a league championship (outright, or is the No. 1 seed by criteria), that team must play at or above the level of its league competition. For instance, if a school wins a championship in a D3 league but is D4 by enrollment, they would be forced to play D3 in that year's playoffs.
4. **Three in a Row.** Schools that win three championships in a row will be moved up one division. If that school wins again the following year at its new level, it will be moved again to the next higher level. Otherwise, the school will remain in that division until it wins three more in a row (moved up one more division).
5. **Continued Success.** If a school has maintained continued success over several years but has not won three straight Section titles, the Section Commissioner (in consultation with the Executive Committee) may recommend to the board that a school be moved to a higher division. Continued success may include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - * Section semifinalist or finalist for four or more years in a row with at least one Section title;
 - or
 - * Four Section titles in a span of six years.
 1. After a school has been moved to a level above its enrollment because of the three in a row rule or the continued success rule, that school may be moved down one level if the following occurs:
 - (a) The school misses the playoffs in any year; or
 - (b) The school fails to reach the semifinals in two consecutive years.
6. A school is not allowed to play in a division lower than its enrollment.
7. **Bracket Size.**
Divisions I III will be 16 teams. Divisions IV VI vrill be 8 teams. Division I-VI will be 12 teams.
Division VII will be six teams.

g j:- Awards

1. The Sac-Joaquin Section will award a pennant to the championship team in each division.
2. A 2nd place plaque for each division will be awarded.
3. Patches will be awarded to the championship team and to the runner-up team.

h k Transportation will be paid for the cost of one vehicle. It will be reimbursed by the Section for each playoff game attended at the rate of \$3 per mile.

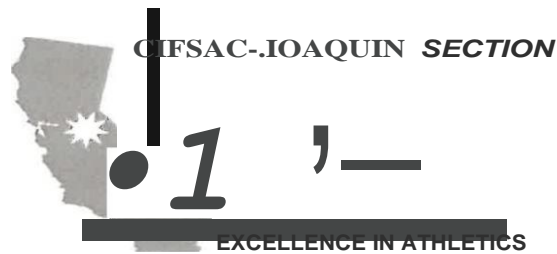

Proposal Summary: This proposal would alter the language in Bylaw 1606 to include the Top 15/Top 10 in the maxpreps rankings instead of the Top 12/Top 8.

Proposal Summary: This proposal would allow schools that desire to play boys soccer in the fall and girls soccer in the spring the opportunity to do so. Schools would be choosing these alternative options for a four year period. The section office would create leagues for the fall and spring season and organize playoffs if a sufficient number of teams participated.

Fiscal Impact: Potential postseason playoff costs as well as potential postseason playoff income – this could yield a positive or negative outcome.

Rationale: For a multitude of reasons that have been expressed by many of our member schools, winter soccer is extremely difficult. Providing this alternative would help to keep soccer programs alive at SJS schools who are struggling.

The rules for divisional placement during the fall and spring season will be at the discretion of the section office.

 1. Each league will qualify three teams in the playoffs. However, if a league has less than six teams participating, that league will qualify two teams.

 1. **Divisions.** The qualifying teams will be placed in divisions in order of enrollment size. However, schools may not play more than one division below their league placement in realignment. If a school's enrollment places them in a division that is two or more divisions below its league placement in realignment, that school will be moved up at least one division for playoffs.
 2. **Section Champion From Previous Year.** If a school wins a Section championship at a particular level, that school must play at or above that level the following year.
 3. **League Champions.** If a team wins a league championship (outright, or is the No. 1 seed by criteria), that team must play at or above the level of its league competition. For instance, if a school wins a championship in a D3 league but is D4 by enrollment, they would be forced to play D3 in that year's playoffs.
 4. **Three in a Row.** Schools that win three championships in a row will be moved up one division. If that school wins again the following year at its new level, it will be moved again to the next higher level. Otherwise, the school will remain in that division until it wins three more in a row (moved up one more division).

5. **Continued Success.** If a school has maintained continued success over several years but has not won three straight Section titles, the Section Commissioner (in consultation with the Executive Committee) may recommend to the board that a school be moved to a higher division. Continued success may include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - * Section semifinalist or finalist for four or more years in a row with at least one Section title;
 - or
 - * Four Section titles in a span of six years.
 - i. After a school has been moved to a level above its enrollment because of the three in a row rule or the continued success rule, that school may be moved down one level if the following occurs:
 - (a) The school misses the playoffs in any year; or
 - (b) The school fails to reach the semifinals in two consecutive years.
6. A school is not allowed to play in a division lower than its enrollment.
7. **Bracket Size.** The size of each bracket will be determined by the Section office after it is known how many total teams will qualify for the playoffs.

- f. If a player in soccer receives a red card in the last league game and his/her team advances on to the Section playoffs, he/she will sit out the first Section playoff game. Proposal Summary: At the April 2017 State Federated Council meeting, State CIF Bylaw 1206 was passed which standardized the allowable number of contacts throughout the state in all sports that culminate in a regional or state championship. This proposal aligns the Sac-Joquin Section with the state adopted allowable numbers of contacts for all sports (not just those culminating in a regional or state championship), which has been the practice of the SJS. Additionally, this proposal includes editorial revisions of Article 12 (1200) and Bylaw 505.

Fiscal Impact: None

Rationale: Increasing our contacts to align with the state adopted allowable number places our member schools on a level playing field with other sections across the state. The editorial changes are an attempt to consolidate contact information into one section of our bylaws, thus making them more user friendly.

Proposal Summary:

Bylaw 504.M currently includes an exception that allows those schools founded upon the religious tenets of observing a Sabbath day of respite from sundown Friday until sundown Saturday to declare an alternate day of respite of Friday or Saturday. The proposed revision clarifies and strengthens the exception language. The revision clarifies the alternate day of rest as a 24-hour period running from sundown Friday - sundown Saturday. This more closely matches the beliefs and practices of member schools whom have Sabbath rest as a part of their school tenets. It also strengthens the exception language by requiring documentation, if necessary, of schools' religious beliefs. Additionally, the proposed change closes a potential loophole where students could play games on 7 consecutive days (Friday afternoon, Saturday night, and Sunday). Schools that observe a Sabbath day of rest will be treated equitably along with other CIF member schools.

Background:

The enforcement of the current bylaw language unfairly limits religious schools' athletic participation. Currently by declaring an alternate day (Friday or Saturday) these religious schools would be restricted by religious belief and organizational bylaw from participating in athletic events/practices for approximately 41 hours if Friday is declared, or approximately

31 hours if Saturday is declared. If religious school were to declare an alternate day to Sunday it would potentially limit accommodation options for playoff participation and also limits participation by the religious schools in traditional pre-season tournament play (Thursday-Saturday). If an alternate day is not declared then these religious schools are restricted by religious belief and organizational bylaws from participating in athletic events/practices for 48 hours total each week. The sundown to sundown period could open the door for religious schools to practice or play all week and then participate in a Friday afternoon, Saturday night, and Sunday tournament with other religious schools. The proposed revision would limit this potential opening by not allowing seven consecutive days of athletic participation (practice and/or games) and requiring documentation (as necessary) of adherence to that rule.

CIF Bylaw 504.L (Sundays)

In order to provide at least one day of respite from involvement in interscholastic athletics each week, no interscholastic games or practices of any kind are to be held on Sunday.

Exception: Those schools founded upon religious tenets that observe ~~the~~ a Sabbath rest from Friday sundown until Saturday sundown may practice or play on Sundays. These schools must register each year by August 1 for the following year with their Section office and ~~observe indicate either Friday or Saturday as their alternate~~ a day of respite from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday. No school requesting a religious exception may participate in interscholastic participation (practice and/or games) on seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.

- a. Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of religious belief adhering to the basis of the exception.
- b. Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of adherence to the rule of no interscholastic participation (practice and/or games) within seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.

NOTE: Declaration of Alternate Day of Respite form is available through your local Section office.

- (1) Violation of Bylaw 504.L. will result in the following sanctions:
 - a. **Practice:** For every practice conducted ~~on-a~~ during the declared ~~day-of~~ respite time, the violating school will be prohibited from conducting twice as many regularly scheduled practices (2 for 1);
 - b. **Game:** A game played ~~on-a~~ during the declared ~~day-of~~ respite time will result in forfeiture of the game.
- (2) In addition to the above sanctions, the Section may impose any of the following additional sanctions:
 - a. The final season record will be reduced by at least one win at the conclusion of the season;
 - b. The school will be placed on probation;
 - c. The team/individual will be ineligible to advance to or in Section, Regional or State Championships;
 - d. Reduction of maximum number of contests allowed for the following year in that sport;
 - e. Repeated violation may result in suspension of membership in the CIF.

Proposal Summary:

This proposal clarifies who CIF member schools are allowed to play. Schools would be allowed to compete with other CIF member schools or with schools who are members of other state associations and are eligible to play in their respective state playoffs.

Background:

In recent years, CIF member schools have been engaging in competition with schools from other state associations who have membership in their state but are not allowed to play in their state playoffs. In some instances, these schools are not allowed to compete with member schools of their own state because they are not required to follow the same eligibility rules. This proposal would help to ensure that CIF member schools are playing other education based high schools and not academy like programs.

502. NON-CIF MEMBER SCHOOL/CLUB TEAMS

A. CIF member schools shall only compete with other member schools of the CIF and/or schools who are members of another state association/federation who are eligible to participate in their respective state association/federation playoffs (see Bylaw 705 for International Competition).

NOTE: Implementation would begin in 2019-2020.

B.A. No school belonging to the CIF shall compete, scrimmage or practice with any team outside the jurisdiction of the CIF without the consent of the CIF Section involved. A school disregarding this rule may be suspended from participation in that sport as determined by their respective CIF Section. (See Bylaw 511)

C.B. Sections may establish a policy, procedure and requirements for review of applications of CIF member schools wishing to compete with a Non-CIF member.

D.C. If a CIF high school team is approved by their Section to compete against a non-CIF team in any competition, the activity shall be played under the high school rules for that sport.

E.D. High school students or teams shall not compete or practice against other individuals or teams in football or wrestling unless the players or such teams meet the age requirements of the CIF. High school students or teams shall not compete or practice against other individuals or outside/club teams-unless the individual players and the individuals on the outside/club team meet the age requirements of the CIF.

F.E. In order to grant athletic opportunities to students who attend schools that for a limited amount of time cannot afford to offer a sport, an outside team consisting of students from these schools may be formed and may scrimmage or practice against a CIF member school provided the following:

- (1) A district board or private school governance board states that a program is not affordable for a limited time to be designated by the district board or the private school board;
- (2) A district board or private school governance board requests participation for its students;
- (3) The league against which these teams plan to compete grants approval prior to Section approval;
- (4) Approval of the Section is granted;
- (5) Officials of the requesting school(s) must understand this request is granted for up to a two (2)-year term. An additional term may be granted if all provisions are met;
- (6) That schools and districts recognize that such outside teams are not granted status as league members nor do they qualify for league, Section or State playoffs or Championships;

(7) An administrator of one of the requesting schools agrees to accept responsibility and supervision of the team and agrees that students will meet eligibility requirements expected of students in CIF member schools.

CIF member schools shall compete with other member schools of the CIF and/or schools who are members of another state association or federation who participate in their respective state association or federation playoffs.

Proposal Summary: This proposal would continue to restrict full contact practice to two days per week as prescribed by law but would limit that full contact to no more than 45 minutes per day for a total of 90 minutes per week. This time limitation applies only to full contact which is described on the following page. The current Bylaw limits full contact to no more than 90 minutes per day for a total of 180 minutes per week.

Fiscal Impact: None

Background: With the passage of A.B. 2127 and CIF Bylaws 2001. A & B in 2014, California limited “full contact practices” in football. At the time, California was a national leader in establishing a limitation at 2 days per week and more than 90 minutes per session. Today, our CIF Bylaw is considered one of the most liberal standards in the nation.

A.B. 2127 allows the CIF to have a more restrictive limitation on full contact practice than prescribed by law.

2001.B.

Football teams are limited to two days per week of full contact practice, with no more than ~~45~~ 90 minutes of full contact on each of those days during the season of sport. For purposes of this Bylaw, each team's season of sport is defined as the first day of practice, as allowed by the Section, until the final contest for the team. All full contact practices are prohibited in the off-season which includes team camps. Full contact practice is defined by state statute as a practice where drills or live action is conducted that involves collisions at game speed where players execute tackles and other activity that is typical of an actual tackle football game. For the purposes of this Bylaw, refer to the definition of "Live Action" as defined by USA Football (see below for excerpt from CIF Blue Pages).

Live Action as defined by USA Football (as taken from the CIF Blue Pages):

A drill run in game like conditions and is the only time that players are taken to the ground. Thud is a drill run at an assigned speed through the moment of contact with no pre-determined winner. Contact remains above the waist and players stay on their feet. Thud is considered full-contact by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS).

Q: What are the allowable activities that would NOT be considered full-contact?

A: All of the activities below are NOT considered full-contact and would NOT count against the day/time limitations:

- A team may participate in air, bags/blocking sleds and control drills at any time unless the Section has implemented more restrictive rules. A team may continue to dress in full pads for practice when conducting any of these drills defined below:
 - o **Air** - Players run unopposed without bags or any opposition.
 - o **Bags/Blocking Sleds** - Activity is executed against a bag/blocking sleds, shield or pad to allow for a soft-contact surface, with or without the resistance of a teammate or coach standing behind the bag.
 - o **Control:** Drill is run at assigned speed until the moment of contact with a pre-determined winner. Contact remains above the waist and players stay on their feet allowing an exit for the ball carrier when one is involved in the drill.

CIF Bylaw 2001.B.

Football teams are limited to two days per week of full contact practice, with no more than ~~45~~ 90 minutes of full contact on each of those days during the season of sport. For purposes of this Bylaw, each team's season of sport is defined as the first day of practice, as allowed by the Section, until the final contest for the team. All full contact practices are prohibited in the off-season which includes team camps. - ***Control:** Drill is run at assigned speed until the moment of contact with a pre-determined winner. Contact remains above the waist and players stay on their feet allowing an exit for the ball carrier when one is involved in the drill.*

- d. The transfer is not determined to be based upon a disciplinary situation (See CIF Bylaw 209);
- e. The student meets all other provisions of all CIF Bylaws.

The student shall have unlimited residential eligibility for all sports at all levels under Bylaw 207 after having been enrolled for 12 calendar months from the date of transfer to the new school **or in the case where the student returns to the previous school of eligibility as stated below:**

When a student eligible in School A transfers to School B or any subsequent school and is residentially not eligible, the student may return to School A and shall be determined to be residentially eligible for unlimited participation in interscholastic sports provided the student did not participate in an interscholastic athletic contest while at School B or any subsequent school.

The Commissioners Committee is proposing revisions in Bylaws 211 and 303 that would change the opportunity of athletic eligibility of students attending a Continuation high school. This proposed change would grant the ability of a continuation student to gain athletic eligibility through a Multi-School agreement as long as the students attendance at the Continuation school is NOT a result of discipline.

Background:

On January 27-28, 2017 members of the Federated Council were asked to discuss issues and concerns during roundtable discussions focusing on the future of Education Based Athletics and challenges that the CIF may face. The process concluded with the council prioritizing these future challenges and to offer strategies that might be implemented to address these issues.

One of the top prioritize eligibility concerns were “Home School, Foreign and International Students and Alternative School Students.” This proposal is a result of the direction from the Federated Council to seek alternative paths for eligibility for students who attend a continuation school that is not a result of discipline.

 - b. If the CIF member school and its league are unable to obtain written approval from the appropriate Section, they may appeal for approval, in writing, to the Executive Committee, but only after exhausting any and all appeals procedures established by the respective Section.

C. Small Learning Communities, Small Schools, Alternative Schools, and Charter Schools Housed on a Member School's Campus

- (1) Small learning communities, small schools, alternative schools and charter schools housed on an existing member school's campus are subject to Bylaws 303.B. and C. However, a small learning community, small school, alternative school or charter school housed on an existing member school's campus may apply for an exclusive multi-school relationship with the member school on whose campus they are housed. Where a small learning community, small school, alternative school or charter school housed on an existing member school's campus and the member school on whose campus they are housed apply for an exclusive multi-school relationship, the students at the small learning community, small school, alternative school or charter school will not be eligible to participate for any CIF member school other than the member school on whose campus the small learning community, small school, alternative school or charter school is housed. If a small learning community, small school, alternative school or charter school and the member school on whose campus they are housed are applying for an exclusive multi-school relationship, they shall notify the CIF State Office when they submit their multi-school application.
- (2) Students transferring into small learning communities, small schools, alternative schools or charter schools housed on an existing member school's campus after their initial enrollment in the 9th grade are subject to Bylaw 207.
- (3) Sections are empowered to waive the transfer rule upon request by a school district establishing a new magnet program, small learning community, small school, alternative school or charter school housed on a member school's campus for the first year only; thereafter, all transfer rules apply.

D. Private and Charter Schools Partnering with CIF Member Public Schools Housed on a Separate Campus

Where a private school or a charter school enters into a multi-school agreement with a public school that is housed on a separate campus or with a public-school district, only those students who live within the boundaries of the public-school district may participate in athletics at the member school or at a member school within the district. A student attending such a private school or charter school must participate for the member school in whose attendance area his/her parent(s)/guardian(s)/caregiver reside or the school in the district where the student most recently established residential eligibility prior to attending the private or charter school entering the multi-school agreement.

E. CIF Member School with Multiple Campuses

Teams representing a high school must be composed of students under the direct supervision of one (1) principal and attending class on one (1) campus. Where one school has multiple campuses, a student must participate for the team on whose campus he/she is housed unless the school petitions to be allowed to participate as a single school with multiple campuses under the supervision of one principal. All new applications must be received in the State Office prior to May 31 of the current school year for approval for the following school year and meet all provisions of CIF Bylaw 303 listed above.

DEFINITIONS

School Within a School

This type of school (often times referred to as Academies with a particular academic focus) operating under the umbrella of a comprehensive high school, but has no autonomy in terms of academic accountability.

Small Learning Communities

These schools have their own complete accountability in terms of having their own CDS code, API scores and their own CAHSEE pass rate.

F. Continuation Schools

Continuation schools may not apply for multi-school team status as provided for under this provision. For continuation school eligibility, refer to Bylaw 211.

211. CONTINUATION SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY

A. Current Eligibility

While enrolled in a continuation school **that is a CIF member school**, a student is only eligible to represent the continuation school of attendance.

303. MULTI-SCHOOL CIF MEMBERSHIP

303. F. Continuation Schools

Continuation schools may ~~not~~ apply for multi-school team status as provided for under this provision. **A student must participate for the member school in whose attendance area his/her parent(s)/guardian(s)/caregiver reside or the school in the district where the student most recently established residential eligibility prior to attending the continuation school entering the multi-school agreement. Students attending a continuation school due to disciplinary action that is in place or pending are not eligible to participate under this provision.**

For **other information pertaining to** continuation school eligibility, refer to Bylaw 211.

Q: If a student is attending a continuation school due to truancy, is that considered disciplinary action in place or pending?

A: No. For purposes of this Bylaw, truancy is not considered disciplinary action in place or pending as per Education Code.
