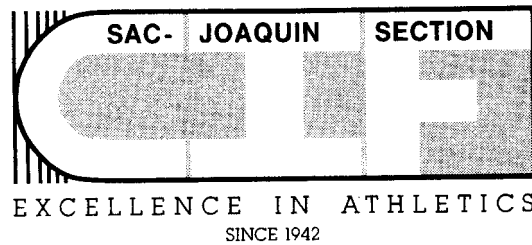

The basketball power rating committee is forwarding its report for approval. There are some changes in the development of the power ratings that were approved by the committee. (Pages 3-6)
2. **Playoff Proposal for 2010-2014**
The entire playoff proposal for the next four years is being presented for approval. Besides the changes in football, the other significant change to the proposal is that three teams from each league will qualify for playoffs in the majority of section sports. The team sports of basketball and volleyball will use the power rating system and football will utilize the system that was approved last year. (separate packet)
3. **Request for Associate Membership from Sugar Bowl Academy**
This school is listed as a separate agenda item because the only sport that they field is skiing and snowboarding. The section staff does not see any problems with this school being an associate member and competing with other schools in the above named sports. (Page 7)

4. **Revision of Bylaws 208.4—208.7**
This revision would give the SJS Executive Committee the ability to reduce sanctions after the Section Commissioner has enforced the CIF SJS Bylaws. This may only be done in regard to forfeitures assessed by the Section Commissioner. The SJS Executive Committee will have the power to enforce other sanctions against a school, including a monetary fine. (Pages 8-9)
5. **Revision of Bylaw 206.4**
This new revision would create a monetary fine for schools that do not submit their CIF Form 206 prior to a student competing in a CIF event. (Page 10)

1. **Master Plan for addition of Regional and State Championships**
The CIF State Office, along with a committee has prepared a long-term timeline for the implementation of regional and state championship events. 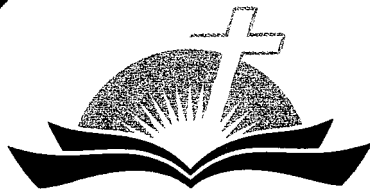



BASKETBALL PLAYOFF POWER RATING FORMULA
2009-10**

NON-LEAGUE POWER RATING: (30% of seeding rating)

1. Each school's non-league opponents are considered.
2. Each non-league opponent is assigned points based on the size of the school:
 - a. Division I - 8 points
 - b. Division II - 8 points
 - c. Division III - 7 points
 - d. Division IV - 7 points
 - e. Division V - 6 points
3. The non-league school size factor is calculated by totaling the opponents' division points then dividing by the number of opponents.
4. A school will receive a win or a loss if they play against another school's JV team in a varsity tournament. The strength factor will not be considered.
5. Non-league games played after January 8, 2010 are not counted.
6. The non-league weighted winning percentage is calculated for each team by combining three factors (team's non-league winning percentage, opponents' non-league winning percentage and opponents' non-league school size factor)
 - * Add:
 - ** 40% of team's non-league winning percentage
 - ** 60% of opponents' winning percentage
 - ** 14% of the difference (non-league school size factor -7.5)

The highest non-league weighted winning percentage earns a 2.4 non-league power rating. All other teams' non-league power ratings are then prorated from 2.4.

7. This is the non-league power rating (30% of the total).

LEAGUE POWER RATING: (70% of seeding rating)

1. Each league is assigned a league strength factor by the seeding committee based on your league's preseason record.
2. The league strength factor is multiplied by the team's won-loss percentage. The result is then multiplied by 70%.
3. This is the league power rating (70% of the total).

SEEDING RATING: (100 percent)

1. Add:
 - a. Non-league power rating ~~times 30%, and~~
 - b. League power rating ~~times 70%.~~
2. Total is seeding rating.

POWER RATING/BASKETBALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 15, 2009

1. All brackets will be 16 teams.
2. Use the ~~present~~ power rating system to select playoff teams for all 10 divisions.
3. Continue the basketball seeding committee for boys and girls using the same basic committee members. The same committee will be utilized for boys and girls.
4. Convene the basketball seeding committee in January to seed all the Sac-Joaquin Section boys and girls leagues in order of strength from highest to lowest using the considerations listed below. A league strength rating will likely be different for boys and girls depending on the relative strength of each respective league.
 - A. Each girls league and boys league shall be allowed a 10-minute presentation to the committee by a designated representative. Boys and girls may have separate reps. If a league representative prefers, he/she may request a conference call with the committee in lieu of attending the meeting in person. However, all of that league's non-league information must be provided to the Section office prior to the meeting.
 - B. Each league representative is responsible for providing the committee with its members' non-league results forms at the time of the meeting along with other data as requested by the committee.
 - C. No league representative will be present when the committee conducts the seeding procedures.

League Strength Rating Considerations

- A. Individual team and league overall preseason won-loss record.
- B. Won-loss record vs. opponents in other Sac-Joaquin Section leagues.
- C. Won-loss record vs. high quality opponents regardless of school size or location.
- D. Other relevant information (such as a league's depth of quality).

LEAGUE STRENGTH RATING

- A. The highest rated league shall be awarded a numerical strength of 8.0. Each subsequent league shall be assigned a number two-tenths (.2) lower until all remaining leagues are seeded. Example: second seeded league is 7.8, third seeded league is 7.6, etc.
- B. Two or more leagues that are determined to be equal can receive the same strength rating. All leagues would receive the average of the number of leagues involved. Example: If the committee felt that three leagues should be seeded the same (i.e., spots 7.8, 7.6 and 7.4), each league would receive a rating of 7.6, which is the average of 7.8, 7.6 and 7.4. The next seeded league would receive a rating of 7.2 and so forth.
- C. The seeding committee may, at its own discretion, move a league up or down two-tenths (.2) after ranking the leagues and prior to releasing the final league strengths. This represents an addition to the procedure outlined under item B of League Strength Rating. The current numbering system shall stay intact and the committee may not rate a league above 8.2 or below 3.0. (The Power Rating Committee feels this change will allow the Seeding Committee to more fairly rate the leagues that are very close in strength).
- D. The league strength factor as determined by the committee will be the number used by all members of said league. However, if a league is divided into divisions and does not play each team in the league an equal number of times, the committee, at its discretion, may assign a separate rating for each of the divisions.
- E. Generally speaking, leagues are grouped by their division for the purpose of rating leagues.
- F. The seeding committee shall decide all issues involving forfeits and/or partially completed games and postponed games.
- G. Any team that goes over the limit of contests (27), will receive the following penalties:
 - 1. The team's league win total will be reduced by the number of games over the limit;
 - 2. The team's league loss total will be increased by the number of games over the limit;
 - 3. The team will not be allowed to host any Section playoff games that season;
 - 4. The team will have its contest limit for the following year reduced by the number of games over the limit.
- H. Separate seeding will be done for boys and girls.
- I. The league record will be 70% of the total power ratings.

NON-LEAGUE STRENGTH FACTOR

- A. Each school's non-league record will be 30% of the total power ratings.
- B. Non-league games played after **January 8, 2010** will not count in each school's non-league strength factor.
- C. The numerical rating system used for pre-season opponents shall be as follows:
Division 1 schools – 8; Division 2 schools – 8; Division 3 schools – 7; Division 4 schools – 7;
Division 5 schools – 6.
- D. A school will receive a win or loss if they play against a JV team in a varsity tournament. A school cannot receive a win or loss if they play their own JV team in said tournament. The strength factor will not be considered.

- E. The seeding committee shall decide all issues involving forfeits and / or partially completed games.
- F. Teams must play a minimum of four non-league games. If a team does not meet the requirement, losses will be added to the team's record to equal four contests. For example, if a team plays only two non-league games, two losses would be added to the record.

FINAL SEEDING MEETING

The seeding committee shall meet at the end of the season to finalize the brackets for each division. It shall have the authority to:

- A. Move a team two spots maximum up or down within the lower half of the tournament bracket to separate first round opponents from the same league. Second round sites shall revert to original power ratings in the event that teams are moved.
- B. Move a team ~~four~~ five spots maximum up or down within the tournament bracket to correct a serious injustice in the seeding. A league champion may be given strong consideration for seeding preference. Criteria for adjustment is at the discretion of the committee.
- C. If two teams from the same league are in the upper half of the tournament bracket, the committee may move the lower of the two teams one spot up or down to separate the two teams into opposite brackets to correct a serious seeding injustice.
- D. If an outright league champion is seeded in the bottom half of the bracket, it may be moved into the top half of the bracket. Teams below will fill the vacated spots.
- E. If a league champion does not qualify for the tournament, the committee may create an outbracket game for that team.

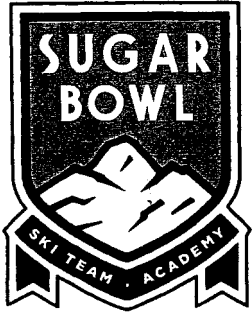
NOTE: The Wilson Basketball for the Section Tournament will be the WILSON SOLUTION BALL.

OFFICIATING

Three-person (two from north/south and one from the other area). The officials would be paid a two-person fee and would have to divide the fee three ways with the section reimbursing the third official for mileage only.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1 -- For home site playoff contests, both the visiting and host teams will have equal access to the playing floor 90 minutes prior to the scheduled game time.
- 2 -- Senior night activities will not be allowed during a home site playoff contest.
- 3 -- Overnight travel: Teams traveling more than 120 miles, one way, to a playoff contest and who receive advance approval, may elect to spend the night at a hotel. Each individual school will be responsible for the cost of the hotel.

CIF Bylaw 208.

A) A hardship is defined as an unforeseeable, unavoidable and uncorrectable act, condition or event that causes the imposition of a severe and non-athletic burden upon the student or his/her family. Sections may only waive the transfer limitation if the conditions of hardship are met, and there is sufficient documentation to support the hardship claim. Sections may not waive the applicable rule if the conditions of hardship are not met.

B) Consideration of any hardship request to a Section requires documentation. Such documents may include, but not be limited to, copies of current transcripts, financial documents, medical statements and/or supportive statements from the previous school attended.

208.1 The correct paperwork (CIF forms 207 and 510) must be submitted to the Section office for all students. If a student participates without the correct paperwork being submitted to the Section office, the student in question will be treated as an ineligible student.

208.2 The student may practice with the team during this period of ineligibility, but may not suit up or participate in an athletic contest for the sport in question. The student becomes eligible on the date approved by the Commissioner.

208.3 Any athletic contests in which an ineligible student has participated either intentionally or unintentionally, involving both team and individual sports, must be forfeited. A statute of limitation of one calendar year from the last league contest will apply. This would apply to any practice, league, playoff game, match, meet or sanctioned event. Report of such forfeiture must be filed with the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section.

208.4

a) The school may submit the correct paperwork (CIF forms 207 and 510) and the Section Commissioner will rule on the student's eligibility as outlined in 208 A and B. If the Section Commissioner is asked to rule on the hardship eligibility of the student in question as outlined above, the forfeitures assessed to the school will not be changed regardless of the ruling of the Section Commissioner.

b) The school may request the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Executive Committee to review the Section Commissioner's decision in regard to the forfeitures that were assessed according to Bylaw 208.3, due to the failure of the school to submit CIF paperwork (CIF forms 207 and 510) in a timely manner. The Executive Committee may review the Section Commissioner's decision in regard to the forfeitures and has the authority to disregard the

forfeits imposed by the Section Commissioner. The Executive Committee will have full discretion in such matters and has the authority to enforce penalties against the school, that may include, but not limited to: a monetary fine, enforcement of administrative regulations, probation, reduction of contacts, etc. The SJS Executive Committee also has the authority to decline review. This discretionary review will be determined by the upcoming playoff timelines and the factors that led to the disclosure of the school to not file the paperwork in a timely manner.

Note: The last contest date for each sport is listed in the SJS Sport Calendar.

208.5 The student may appeal the section's decision of limited transfer eligibility under CIF Bylaw 1100.

208.6 The President of the Sac-Joaquin Section may ask other board members to serve on the panel if there is a conflict of interest for members of the Executive Committee,

208.7 The process outlined in Bylaws 208.4 (b) may only be utilized when the correct paperwork (CIF forms 207 and 510) was submitted after the student participated in a CIF athletic game or contest and the Section Commissioner was required to make a ruling on a hardship waiver. This review will not be utilized in regard to a violation of CIF Bylaw 203 or 204.

Note: All monies collected will be applied directly to the CIF Sac-Joaquin Dale Lacky Scholarship Fund.

CIF Bylaw 206.4

206.4 A student must fill out a CIF Form 206 when his/her family makes a valid change of address. The CIF Form 206 is needed for the situations described in 206 B (2), (3), and (8).

PENALTY: If the CIF Form 206 has not been submitted and approved prior to a student competing in a CIF approved sport for their new school, a school will be fined as follows:

- A \$100 fine will be assessed to the school for each CIF Form 206 form that has not been submitted prior to the student competing in an athletic contest for the new school.
- The school will forfeit all games in which the student competed if they choose not to pay the fine as stated above.

NOTE:

- The above situation will be implemented whether the student competed intentionally or unintentionally. The student will be deemed eligible once the 206 form has been submitted to the Section Office and approved by the Section Commissioner.
- The Section Commissioner will send a letter to the Principal notifying them of the fine and the timeline to submit the money to the Section Office
- The \$100 fine is due in the Section Office one week after the school has received the letter from the Section Commissioner notifying the Principal that a student competed in an athletic contest without completing a CIF 206 form. The Section Commissioner will disregard the forfeits when the member school pays the \$100 fine in a timely manner.
- All monies collected from fines will go directly into the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Dale Lacky Scholarship Program.

RE: Master Plan for the addition of CIF Regional and State Championship Events

The Championships, New Events Committee is recommending the following revisions:

V.B.6.a Master Plan – A previous plan had been approved that took into account many factors such as interest, diversity, Title IX, and number of participants. Proposals were forwarded out of sequence from interested parties and at the time it seemed like the right thing to do was to move forward with these proposals. As a consequence CIF is out of compliance in terms of the number of state championship opportunities we provide to males and females. This master plan takes into account all the previously mentioned issues and also tries to equalize the number of opportunities for north and south regional play.

The Commissioners have recommended rather than have the specific years of implementation listed, place them numerically in the order of implementation. This allows some flexibility for proposals to be developed, taking into consideration staffing issues, and also with the current economic crises it will allow schools time to resolve their financial issues. This proposed revision was discussed with both the Executive Committee and Federated Council in February. At their March meetings, the Commissioners and Executive Committee recommended that the events to be added are done in the order listed. Further, in the absence of a proposal from a Section or advisory committee, CIF staff can forward a proposal to be considered.

Rationale: Balance the number of offerings for boys and girls.

Rationale: Already in place in NorCal. May not be considered for a State Championship event until three years of regional competition have been completed.			

Boys Volleyball	NorCal Regional	Week 45	Week 46
Rationale: Already in place in SoCal. Would only be added if SoCal remains in place. May not be considered for a State event until three years of regional competition have been completed.			

Swimming/Diving	State	Week 46	Week 47
Rationale: No Regional event necessary. Similar model as Track and Field.			

Badminton	NorCal/SoCal Regional	Week 45	Week 46
Rationale: The original criteria for adding events spoke to considering the diversity of our state.

Rationale: Due to the different seasons of sport, the Central Section girls should be allowed to participate in the NorCal Regional. The different seasons of sport would make a State Championship difficult as it could only be offered for the boys.			

Baseball/Softball	NorCal/SoCal Regional	B: Week 48	Week 49
Rationale: Last events added as they would be the most difficult due to the length of season and potential conflicts with graduations. A State Championship would likely extend into mid-June or later.			

Soccer

There are no plans to offer a NorCal Regional due to the different seasons of sport. It has been suggested that if a section in the north (i.e. CCS) wants to play in the SoCal Regional, that request should be given consideration.

Notes:

This is the order in which championship events will be presented. The State CIF may forward a proposal for one of the above events if one is not brought forward by either a CIF Section or that sport advisory committee.

No more than one new Championship Event may be added per school year.

Rationale for Order of Events:

State Girls wrestling is the first event in order to restore balance to the number of State offering for boys and girls sports.

Socal Tennis and NorCal Volleyball were suggested as the next two events as there is already a NorCal Tennis Championship and a Socal Volleyball Championship. Therefore, the Championship New Events Sub-Committee felt that current sports should be offered in both the North and South before any new events are added.

State Swimming/Diving was the next State Championship considered because we felt that there was already a model for it with our Track and Field Championship. Therefore, no Regional Championships are needed so it has a much shorter timeline.

NorCal/Socal Badminton was added due to our criteria calling for the consideration of the diversity of our state when looking at the addition of new events. This Regional Championship will give consideration to a population not being served by our current offerings.

NorCal/Socal Water Polo was a little further down the list of offerings for several reasons. Because not all sections in the South play girls water polo in the same season (CS plays in the Fall), it makes it more difficult than the other sports to host a championship in which every section may compete. This would give more time to consider other options such as allowing the Central Section to compete in the North Regional Championship. Also, given the different seasons of sport between the North and the South Girls, unless one region was willing to change seasons, an eventual State Championship is unlikely. Since the other Regional Sports (tennis and volleyball) do not face this issue, it was recommended that they move ahead of water polo.

NorCal/Socal Baseball and Softball were the last sports added for the reason that baseball will likely extend the Spring season the longest into the month of June and conflict with graduations. Also, sections will most likely have to find ways to move their seasons up in order to conduct Regional Championships that will end by the dates specified in the proposal. Softball may not face the same timelines as baseball but they were put together in this proposal to keep the State in balance re: sport offerings for boys and girls.

Also, these revisions are designed to ensure that Allied Organizations also communicate with their appropriate memberships with regards to the CIF that may effect their members.

32. CRITERIA FOR ALLIED ORGANIZATION MEMBERSHIP ON THE STATE CIF FEDERATED COUNCIL

Each Allied Organization represented on the Federated Council shall:

- A. Be composed of a membership, in which the majority of the membership, which has direct responsibility or legislative responsibility for interscholastic athletics;
- B. Be able to demonstrate statewide representation;
- C. Be able to define its constituency which will include, but not be limited to, the number of interscholastic athletes it represents, the number of members that have direct or legislative responsibility for interscholastic athletics, the number of schools represented which participate in CIF activities, and that it has the capacity to select representatives to the Federated Council that reflect our State's student gender and ethnic make-up;
- D. Be able to demonstrate that its representative ~~will have~~ has a viable system of communication to its members within its organization including but not limited to:
 - a. Conduct meetings, hearings and decision making, involving the CIF, interscholastic athletics and/or other legislative matters, in open session with a view to transparency, providing opportunity for membership/public input thereby reflecting the intention of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code Section 54950 et.seq.).
 - b. Validate the viable system of communication by showing agendas, minutes and membership present when decisions were made regarding CIF, interscholastic athletics and/or legislative decisions that impact CIF and/or interscholastic athletics.
 - c. Submit as part of the request for "Inclusion" all documentation of communications made by the organization regarding CIF philosophy, policies and procedures that has been forwarded to their membership.
 - d. Submit as part of the request for "Inclusion" all documentation of communications received from their membership regarding any CIF philosophy, policies and procedures.

E. Have a commitment to providing educational opportunities for students through interscholastic athletics. Prior to being formally accepted as an Allied organization, each interested group, including those presently represented on the Federated Council, shall complete a Request for Inclusion application. An organization's request for inclusion on the Federated Council as an Allied Organization must be submitted to the Executive Director by January 15 of the school year prior to the desired effective date of inclusion. The request will be reviewed by a membership committee designated by the Executive Committee. A recommendation by the membership committee for approval or disapproval of the Request for Inclusion will be made to the Executive Committee by April 15 and action on the Request for Inclusion will be scheduled for the spring meeting of the Federated Council. If an allied organization is approved for membership, the organization is approved for a four-year renewable term, unless the organization should, during the four-year term, no longer meet the criteria for membership and inclusion as defined by the Federated Council.

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ARTICLE 310
WRESTLING
3101. 40-MATCH RULE
A wrestler will be allowed a maximum of 40 matches during the wrestling season prior to the first qualifying tournament for the CIF State Wrestling Championships (in most situations this would be the league wrestling tournament). Forfeits do not count towards the 40-match maximum. Matches wrestled in any tournaments or competitions held prior to the first qualifying tournament will count towards the 40-match maximum.
EXCEPTION: Any matches wrestled in a Section team dual championship tournament will not count as part of the 40-match maximum.
(Approved October 2001 Federated Council)

1. CONCERN:

There have been some instances where athletes/coaches are violating this rule and there is no state wide guideline of penalties to be invoked upon violation. Some sections have penalties when this occurs and it is very general and applies to all sports within the section.

2. PENALTIES FOR MAXIMUM # CONTEST VIOLATION

Violation of Article 3101 will result in the following sanctions:

- a. **Matches; if an athlete goes over the prescribed 40 match limit the athlete shall be ineligible for any further competition for the season.**

In addition to the above sanctions, the Section, depending on the violation, may impose the following additional sanctions:

- (1) The final season record will be reduced by at least one win at the conclusion of the season;
- (2) The school will be placed on probation;
- (3) The team/individual will be ineligible to advance to or in Section, Regional or State Championships;
- (4) Reduction of maximum number of matches allowed for the following year in that sport;
- (5) Repeated violation may result in suspension of membership in the CIF.

LIMITED Periods: September 1 – May 31

- Practices can be a maximum of 1.5 hours/day or 8 hours/week
- Contests are not permitted Monday - Thursday
- Weekend contests/tournaments (Fri.-Sun.) are permissible but must be sponsored by an outside organization
- Individual Sports (Cross Country, B/G Golf, B/G Tennis, Wrestling, B/G Swimming, B/G Track) will continue to adhere to Bylaw 511.5 and 511.6.
- Schools may choose to conduct activity during the “Limited” period that is sponsored by an agency not under the authority of the CIF. If this option is chosen the use of school equipment is not permitted, any facility usage must be approved by the school district, and the group must provide proof of insurance.

519. NUMBER OF ALLOWABLE CONTESTS

- A. Each Section and/or league which establishes a maximum and/or minimum number of allowable contests for member schools shall establish the same number of allowable contests for all teams in identical sports, and in baseball and softball.
- B. When practical and sufficient interest exists, the number of events offered in a contest in identical sports for boys and girls shall be equal except where rules are written by a recognized rules writing body that provides for a different number of events.

519.1 Sports which traditionally have two events per week (basketball, baseball, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, volleyball, water polo, track, cross country, swimming and badminton) are limited to ~~27~~ 25 contacts per season. There is no limit on number of tournaments allowed per season. Football is allowed 10 contests. Wrestlers are allowed 40 matches per season (See Bylaw 3101).

- a. In order to offer interscholastic competition to newly built schools and to honor previous commitments in scheduling, leagues may exceed the ~~27~~ 25 contact limitation by two contacts at the freshman and frosh-soph levels only. This contact waiver is in effect only until the new school enrolls juniors. At that time, the school is expected to field varsity teams.

519.2 **SCRIMMAGES**

A maximum of two scrimmages per team are permissible prior to the first game (league or non-league) of the season. Said scrimmages shall not count in the team's contact total. Scrimmages held after a team's first game shall count as contacts.

NOTE: A scrimmage is defined as supervised competition between two or more teams where:

- 519.2 a. No officials are paid.
- b. No admission is charged; closed scrimmages are permissible (Donations are acceptable).
- c. No score/results are released to the media.
- d. No awards are presented.

519.3 **DEFINITION OF A CONTEST**

The definition of a contest is defined in the appropriate National Federation Rules Book.

519.4 **SPORTS INCORPORATING POOL PLAY**

- a. For the purpose of this bylaw, pool play is defined as a shortened game as determined by NFHS and Sac-Joaquin Section rules.
- b. Volleyball and water polo are the only sports allowed to use pool play during tournament competition.
- c. Any one-day tournament shall count as two contacts.
- d. Any additional 1/2 day (scheduled six hours maximum) will count as an additional contact.
EXAMPLE: A tournament involving pool play that lasts Friday night and all day Saturday would count as three contacts. A tournament involving pool play that lasts two full days would count as four contacts.

519.5 **TOURNAMENTS INVOLVING INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION**

The following individual sports must utilize the following tournament guidelines in determining the structure of the tournament.

- a. Golf – Each day of a tournament will be counted as two contacts.
- b. Tennis – Each day of a tournament will be counted as two contacts.
- c. Wrestling – A tournament can be a maximum of two days in length and each individual may wrestle a maximum of five matches per day. This is in accordance with the National Federation rules.

511.4

END OF COMPETITION

The final date for interscholastic competition, other than Sac-Joaquin Section or CIF State playoffs, is determined by the Board of Managers annually and stated in the sport rules of this constitution.

- a. Teams that do not qualify for postseason CIF state or Sac-Joaquin Section playoffs are not allowed to compete after the completion of the league season.
- b. Teams that do qualify for postseason CIF state or Sac-Joaquin Section playoffs may play a game or scrimmage against another Sac-Joaquin Section opponent (no tournament competition will be allowed) as long as:
 - i. The game or scrimmage is after league competition ends and before playoffs in that sport and division begin;
 - ii. Both teams have qualified for the Sac-Joaquin Section or CIF state playoffs.
 - iii. Neither team shall exceed the number of contacts as defined in 519.1.

1903.2 **TEAM CAMPS:** Any school attending or hosting a "team camp" must have the approval of the school principal and the superintendent or his/her designee. "Team camps" must include a minimum of four school teams. A student may only attend one team camp for a maximum of five consecutive days. School equipment may be used at the "team camp." A "team camp" must be under the authority of an outside agency not affiliated with a school or its school district. Booster clubs, community organizations and private companies or individuals do not qualify as an outside agency for the purpose of this rule.

NOTES:

1. Any approval of a "team camp" must be forwarded to the school's league commissioner. Any violation of this rule will be sent to the league for appropriate action.
2. Individual camps are not affected by this bylaw as long as a member's school equipment is not used.

Bylaw 701.1

All tournaments or events that involve more than one school within the Sac-Joaquin Section must have the host school's name in the title of the event.

Two acceptable examples:

Elk Grove/Bill Cartwright Basketball Classic or

Bill Cartwright Basketball Classic sponsored by Elk Grove High School.

CIF SJS Constitution, Article 6. Section 6

It shall be the responsibility of the Section Commissioner to negotiate, set the rights fee to telecast and contract any contest hosted by a Sac-Joaquin Section member school that will be broadcast on a regional or national basis via an over-the-air station, cable outlet made available to multiple cable service providers, or satellite transmitted station, outlet or programming network.

Schools participating in any such telecast will be compensated for any additional costs directly attributed to providing additional facilities or staffing in support of that telecast. Additional services and staffing to be provided must be approved, in advance, by the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section office. All monies generated from the rights fee will be sent directly to the host school.

Telecasts of non-playoff contests on a school or school district owned television station, or by a local cable television provider where the broadcast is not provided to another provider nor broadcast or re-broadcast via satellite or over-the-air, are excluded from the Commissioner's authority.

INVESTMENT POLICY FOR THE CIF SAC-JOQUIN SECTION

1. **GENERAL RESERVE**

The California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Sac-Joaquin Section (SJS) shall create a general unallocated reserve comprised of cash and investments to be set aside for unanticipated needs, for health benefit needs, for major purchases meant to enhance the organization's assets and provide annually specified income to support the operating budget.

Decisions to use any part of the general unallocated reserve shall be the responsibility of the CIF SJS Executive Committee in accord with this policy and the authority granted in Article 4, Section 1 (4a) of the CIF SJS Constitution. Any decisions made by the Executive Committee will be reported at the subsequent Section Board of Manager's Meeting.

2. **GENERAL RESERVE GOAL**

The Executive Committee and the Board of Managers established that the amount in reserve (cash) should be no less than 30% of our annual operating expenses for the organization.

3. **INVESTMENTS**

A. **Policy Goal**

It shall be the policy of the CIF SJS that investments are made to preserve the capital and maximize rate of return.

(1) **Objectives**

- a. Preservation of capital.
- b. Maximum rate of return.
- c. Investments made consistent with prudent principles regarding those investments.
- d. Provision of resources to allow CIF SJS to meet any major, unanticipated expense.
- e. Investments and policy, which will produce annual income to aid the CIF SJS's annual budget needs.
- f. Balance in investments should be maintained to produce:
 - (i) Income – current, annual income to help meet budget needs
 - (ii) Growth – provide for growth of principal
 - (iii) Safety – provide for sufficient limitations upon risks and protect the principal through diversification of assets and the setting of specific standards.

(2) **Compliance with State and Federal Laws**

Investments will be made in compliance with State and Federal Laws and regulations.

(3) **Permitted Investments**

- a. Common and Preferred Stocks
- b. US Government Obligations
- c. Corporate bonds
- d. Bond funds
- e. Mutual funds (Equity and Bond)
- f. Money market funds
- g. Purchase of real property
- h. International investments (Equity and Bond)

(4) **Prohibited Investments**

- a. Securities on margin
- b. Commodity futures
- c. Derivative securities
- d. Selling "short"
- e. Leveraged buyouts
- f. Venture capital
- g. Private placement
- h. Limited partnerships

(5) **Return Focus**

The CIF SJS is interested in preservation of principal, current income, along with long-term growth in an attempt to keep pace with inflation. Accordingly, a moderate to conservative risk profile should be kept in mind.

The following portfolio is currently in place for the CIF SJS:

Equity

U.S. Stocks 25% (Wachovia Investments)

Bonds

U.S. Bonds 25% (Wachovia Investments)

Cash 50% (Bank of America)

NOTE: If necessary, the investment portfolio shall be rebalanced once a year in order to maintain the asset allocation by category outlined in this moderate to conservative portfolio model.

(7) **Allocation Goal**

A moderate to conservative portfolio will have more emphasis on bonds and cash and less on equities. This blend will most likely exceed long-term inflations by a small margin and has a moderate degree of risk.

Assets should be managed in such a fashion that future changes to the allocation can be made without commissions or penalties.

4. **REPORTING**

The CIF SJS Board of Managers shall receive a report on current holdings and investments at each regularly scheduled meeting.

It shall be the responsibility of the Section Commissioner to present this report or to designate responsibility for this report to an appropriate staff member.

The Executive Committee will review the report and advise the Board of Managers on actions when deemed appropriate.

Such reports should include a complete listing of holdings, investments and cash (cash equivalents) and should show profit or loss along with comparisons to appropriate benchmarks.

1905. NUMBER OF GAMES LIMITATION

A high school football team of whatsoever classification or name shall not play more than two games in any eight-day period. A continued game under National Federation football rules shall not be considered in this limitation.

1905.1 An athlete may not play in more than one contest in a one-week period (Monday through Saturday). This rule applies to a scrimmage or game once a school's program plays its first of 10 allowed contests.

1905.2 For new schools that have just freshmen and sophomores, it may schedule a contest with another school that is scheduled to play another opponent during that week. Only those athletes that did not play more than two quarters in the previous game that week are eligible for competition in the second game against the new school. One play in a quarter constitutes a quarter played.

5. **APPROVAL, DIRECTION OF INVESTMENTS**

Recommendations for purchase and/or sale of investments shall be made in accordance with the following process:

A. **Investment Advisor**

The CIF SJS will use the services of an investment advisor. The current advisor is Ms. Virginia Reyes, Senior Vice President-Investment Officer with Wells Fargo Advisors. Such advisor shall meet via telephone conference with the CIF SJS Investment Committee at least once a year. This meeting will take place in June and, when requested, may meet with the Investment Committee as needed. The Investment Advisor may advise the CIF SJS Investment Committee with respect to recommended changes to the CIF SJS Investment Portfolio.

B. **Finance/Investment Committee**

The CIF Investment Committee shall be comprised of the CIF officers (President, President-Elect and Past President). The Investment Committee and the Section Commissioner shall make its recommendation to the CIF SJS Executive Committee.

C. **Executive Committee**

The CIF SJS Executive Committee shall forward any major decisions with respect to purchases, transfers and/or liquidation of portfolio assets to the Section Board of Managers for final approval. All investment decisions must be consistent with the goals and objectives of the CIF Investment Policy.
